FRUIT GROWERS ASSOCIATION.—The regular meeting of the West of Fruit Growers Association was held at Summerside yesterday afternoon. There was a fair attendance. Among those present were Lieutenants Governor Dowling, and E Bayfield, Esq., President of the Provincial Fruit Growers Association, both of whom gave excellent addresses regarding the cultivation of fruit. Mr. Johnson, of Lo z River, also gave an interesting and instructive address along the same line. It was decided that the Western Association should amalgamate with the provincial organization. The suggestion of a fruit and flower show at Charlottetown was given by Lieutenant-Howan, and will in all probability be acted upon during the coming autumn.
