Tourist Bureau Notes Increase

Inquiries from prospective visitors to the Island continue to pour into the Travel Bureau, George V. Fraser, bureau director, said yesterday. More than 9,000 were received in April alone. He said it was of interest to note that for the first four months of this year the number of inquiries from adults alone was almost as great as the total from adults and school children for

the first four months of 1961. Mr. Fraser said that school children from many parts of North America wrote for information about Prince Edward Island to add them in their school work. The number of such inquiries runs around 1,200 a month during the school term. This year to the end of April the Bureau has received approximately 15,430 inquiries and the staff has been kept busy mailing literature dealing with the tourist facilities here. While there was a slight decrease in the total number of inquiries in April the over-all picture for the first third of the calendar year shows a sharp increase, Mr. Fraser noted.

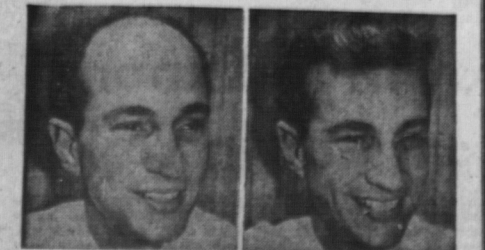

Province To Pay More To Repay Bond Issue

Stabilization of the Canadian dollar, at 92½ cents in terms of the American dollar, will mean that this province will pay more than expected in repaying a \$4,000,000 bond issue sold on the American market in 1960. Provincial Treasurer Melvin McQuaid said yesterday that he had not yet calculated the extra cost of repaying the issue, but at the time it was floated a "cushion" of \$305,000 to take care of fluctuations in the exchange rate was provided.

U.S. SALE BETTER
Mr. McQuaid said that by selling to the American market, it cost this province less than it would have on the Canadian market.

He explained that it would cost \$3,855,000 to repay the issue; this includes the \$4,000,000 principal, interest charges of \$4,600,000, commission charges of \$40,000 and exchange costs at the time the loan was made of \$215,000. Total repayment cost to the government if the issue had been sold on the Canadian market would have been \$9,100,000, Mr. McQuaid said. "So," he said, "extra costs by a change in the exchange rate can go as high as \$305,000, and we will still be in the same position as if we had sold the issue on the Canadian market."

Gov't's Bank Loan Guarantee Plan For Fertilizer Outlined

Details on the decision of the government's Executive Council to guarantee bank loans for the purchase of fertilizer for Island potato growers were outlined Wednesday by Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae. The government will guarantee to the banks an amount not to exceed 10 per cent of the aggregate loans made to farmers, with a potato acreage of between three and 10 acres, or a maximum of \$500.

The guarantees are subject to the following: It is mandatory that the crop be insured with the Crop Insurance Agency, and that the insurance be assigned to the bank making the loan, that a crop mortgage shall be taken by the bank making the loan; that loans will be made only to credit-worthy farmers; loans made under this arrangement will be guaranteed by the government in connection with the 1962 crop year and will remain in effect until June 30, 1963; that claims under this guarantee be made before July 31, 1963 and that each bank be provided a reporting number, and also that the banks be supplied with reporting forms by the government.
