TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

OTTAWA, May 25.

An accident occurred on the Rideau Canal, which almost resulted in the death of Miss Griffin, daughter of the Deputy Postmaster-General. It appears she was induced to get into a bark canoe by young Smellie and a companion, 13 and 14 years respectively, and after they had paddled up the stream a short distance, the frail craft capsized, Miss Griffin going under. Young Smellie on coming to the surface and missing the young lady, called to his companions to dive for her. Both boys disappeared simultaneously and presently came up with the young lady, whom they placed on the top of the canoe and swam ashore with her.

MONTREAL, May 26.

Mr. Jefferson Davis, the ex-President of the southern confederacy, is in this city at present. His object in coming here was to get his new work copyrighted. He is looking well and is much pleased with the wonderful improvements in Montreal since his former visit in 1864.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, May 26.

To-day, Cyrus W. Field stated that he expected to devote his whole time to the exposure of one of the foulest conspiracies ever devised for the destruction of railway property and that among the conspirators will be found men who have held high offices, some who now hold such positions as railway directors, brokers, representatives of the press and others.

ALBANY, N. Y., May 26.

There is nothing new in the contest for Senators. Both sides remain firm and a bitter feud prevails.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, May 25.

Summonses have been issued to members of Parliament, and other members of the Land League in Great Britain, convening a special meeting to consider the urgent state of affairs in Ireland, and immediate measures for obtaining an expression of English opinion.

LONDON, May 26.

The Whitechapel (London) District Board of Public Works have felt compelled to take measures to check overcrowding of emigrants there en route to America from the Continent. They are consigned by the hundred at the time to agents in London, and sleep crowded together on straw in low lodging houses, regardless of health or decency.

LONDON, May 26.

A special meeting of members of Parliament and other members of the Land League in Great Britain, convened to consider the urgent state of affairs in Ireland, was presided over by Justin McCarthy (Home Ruler), member of Parliament for Loughford. A resolution was passed summoning Irishmen of England and Scotland and English sympathizers to revoke public opinion on the evictions of tenant farmers in a series of demonstrations; it was also resolved to hold demonstrations at Hyde Park, Oldham, Middleborough and other places.

Gleanings and Gossip.

THE CALCUTTA STREET PREACHERS.

Calcutta advices state that the case of five missionaries, summoned before the authorities for street preaching, has been adjourned till next Saturday. The Government approves of the action of the Commissioners of Police in this matter.

RENDS IN RUSSIA.

A St. Petersburg despatch says the projects for the diminution of the peasants' rents in the thirteen northern governments, and the compulsory purchase of lands not yet ceded to them in accordance with the Emancipation Act of 1861, have now been finally sanctioned by the Council of the Empire, and only await the Czar's signature.

PRINCE LEOPOLD'S NEW TITLE.

The Official Gazette of a recent date states that his Royal Highness Prince Leopold has been created a peer of England with the title of Duke of Albany, and will now be entitled to take his seat in the House of Lords with his brothers, who sit one as Duke of Saxony, Cornwall, and Rothesay, another as Duke of Edinburgh, and a third as Duke of Connaught.

THE NIBBLERS.

A St. Petersburg despatch says important arrests continue daily. Messy Helfmann, sentenced to death for complicity in the murder of the Czar, and reprieved on account of her delicate condition, has been delivered of a still born child. Another conspirator's den containing a large store of arms and dynamite has been found near Warsaw. The occupants had previously deserted the house.

BEAUTY AND BEHAVIOUR.

AYOUB KHAN PREPARING FOR WAR.

A despatch from Candahar says Ayoub Khan contemplates an early movement on

Candahar. He is now engaged in collecting men and material for the war. Both sides are preparing for a struggle. The deputy governor of Candahar is sending out troops to Garkish and other places. The Times, in referring to the above, thinks there is a prospect of stirring news from Afghanistan.

MORMONS IN THE STATES.

Notwithstanding the expressed intention of President Garfield to deal vigorously with the polygamous Mormons, the rains have, by no means, interrupted their efforts to add to their converts or dupes. Nearly two hundred men, women and children arriving at New York a week or ten days ago by the Wyoming, of the Union Line, on their way to Utah. This is the first instalment this year, but as the Mormon emissaries are said to be putting forth more than ordinary exertions in the British Islands and all over the continent of Europe to induce them to join them, many hundreds more may be looked for before the end of the summer.

EVICCTIONS.

A British Parliamentary return has been issued of cases of evictions which have come to the knowledge of the constabulary in each of the years from 1849 to 1880. In 1849, 93,440 persons were evicted, of whom 18,375 were readmitted. In 1880 the evictions rose to 104,163, and the readmissions to 30,292. Since that period the numbers rapidly fell, till in 1860 they only amounted to 7,985. They, however, again increased, and in 1864 9,201 persons were evicted. There was again a falling off, and in 1859 the lowest number was reached, and 1,741 persons were only evicted. Since then there has been a gradual increase, and in 1879 the figures stood at 6,269, and in 1880 at 10,457, the readmissions being 663 and 1,021 respectively. The totals from 1849 to 1880 are: Evicted, 90,107 families, 460,570 persons; readmitted, 21,349 families, 115,259 persons.
