Froehling Stops Australian Star

FOREST HILLS, N.Y. (AP)—Frank Froehling III of Coral Gables, Fla., tennis's gauging stepchild, smashed his way back into America's Davis Cup picture Wednesday with a stunning 6-4, 4-6, 9-7, 6-2 triumph over second-seeded Roy Emerson in the fourth round of the U.S. championships.

The six-foot-three Trinity University student, number by the Davis Cup and a tournament seeding committee this year although he is ranked No. 2 nationally, literally blasted the tough Queenslander off the court.

He served with such blazing power that Emerson repeatedly missed the ball completely or barely got his racket on it. The Australian shook his head in disbelief.

Emerson—the Australian and French champion—broke three racquets during the course of the match—apparently just from trying to block Froehling's cannonball deliveries, which dug his divots out of the grass court in the grandstand.

Before the match Froehling, 21, said he planned to play his heart out for a victory in order to get out of the tennis dog house.

"They don't like me because I was a cut-up as a kid, but that's all past now," he said.

The towering Floridian was joined in the men's quarter-finals by three U.S. Davis Cup team members, Chuck McKinley, Dennis Ralston and Martin Riessen; Mexico's catlike Rafael Osuna and a pair of grandkillers from Brazil, Bonnie Barnes and Thomas Koch.

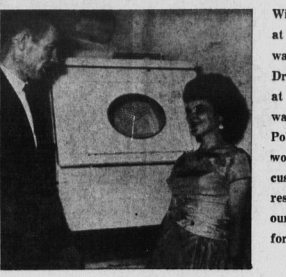
Home Runs Win Games

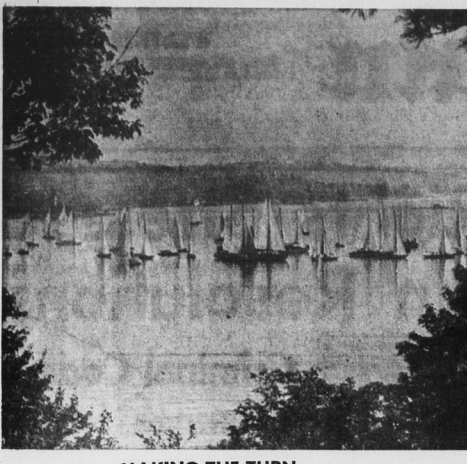

Moonshine Possession Results In \$100 Fine

ALBERTON —A St. Louis resident, Cecil Donette, was fined \$100 and costs or 30 days in jail by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald at Alberton yesterday when he pleaded guilty to possession of illicitly manufactured spirits, 48 ounces of moonshine.

Merle Mark Deagle, Ebbwfleet, who failed to appear in court, was fined \$100 and costs or 15 days in jail for driving while impaired, and Peter Andrew Martin, Alma, was fined \$75 and costs or 15 days for driving a tractor while impaired.

Leo Richard, 16, of Tignish, pleaded guilty to breaking and entering the Canadian Legion in Tignish and committing an indictable offense. Sentence was adjourned for a week.

A 17-year-old O'Leary youth, Wayne Gallant, pleaded guilty to stealing a sum of money, less than \$50 from the Church of St. Simon and St. Jude. Tignish and sentence was adjourned for one week.

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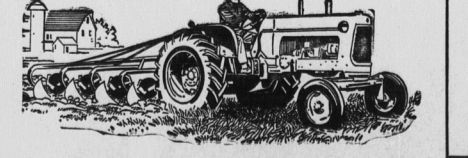
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500 Enrol At Three Tignish Schools; 207 In Regional High
