P.C.'s To Hold Fifth Queens Convention In City Today

At least two other prominent Progressive Conservatives, along with Lt. Col. J. David Stewart, D.S.O., are expected to allow their names to go before the nominating convention when the Fifth District P.C.'s meet at the Clover Club this evening.

Expected to seek nomination for councillor in the Queen's County district will be two well known Charlottetown barristers, Charles R. McQuaid and M. Alban Farmer, Q.C. Col. Stewart presumably will seek nomination for Assemblyman.

Mr. Farmer graduated from Dalhousie University in 1922 with a degree of LL.B., articulated with J.O.C. Campbell, Q.C. and later went into partnership with the late H. J. Palmer. He served as private secretary to late Lieutenant Governors Sir Charles Dalton and Hon. George D. DeBlois and was a candidate for the Mayoralty on two occasions.

Mr. Farmer is a former president of the Charlottetown Board of Trade, a director of the Maritime Hospital Association and is vice president for Prince Edward Island on the Canadian Chamber of Commerce. He is married to the former Dorothea MacMillan and they have a family of four.

Valdes Stopped In 8th Round

MIAMI BEACH, Fla (AP) — Charley Powell, 213½, of San Diego, Calif., a 4-to-1 underdog, scored a stunning upset when he stopped Nino Valdes, 224, of Havana in the eighth round of their scheduled 10-round fight Wednesday night.

Referee Cy Gottfried stopped the fight when the bloody and bewildered Cuban went down for the third time. One of Powell's blows draped Valdes over the middle strand of the ropes like a sack of oats.

Valdes, semi-hysterical in his dressing room afterward, claimed he was knocked down only twice in the final round and he believed the bout was stopped because he was down three times.

Slide Still Moving

HERBRIGGEN, Switzerland (AP) — The 1,000,000-ton rock slide threatening this deserted Alpine village moved 22 inches downhill in the warm weather of the last two days. The lower part of the huge mass of rock, earth and ice still is 640 feet from the edge of the precipice which towers almost vertically above Herbriggen.

Senator Sees Life Too Easy

OTTAWA (CP)—A member of the former Liberal government, that introduced family allowances in Canada said Wednesday he has grave doubts that they "have improved the social structure of this country."

Manitoba Senator Thomas A. Crerar told the Upper House that after spending \$3,500,000 on allowances "we find today that juvenile delinquency in this country is at a higher level than it has ever been."

Senator Crerar was minister of mines in the cabinet of the late W. J. Mackenzie King when family allowances were introduced at the 1944-45 session. He went to the Senate before the June, 1945, general election.

"I sometimes think I have lingered on the stage too long," Senator Crerar said. "But I cannot grow enthusiastic over these ardent desires by socialists, dogooders and uplifters to benefit humanity in all its aspects."

"I distrust them. It is not a good or a wise thing to make conditions too easy for the young men and women starting out in life. There are such things as discipline, which we had in the early years, which are of incalculable benefit to people in their later years."
