CONTRACT BRIDGE

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been: South West North East 1 Pass 1 Pass 2 Pass 2 Pass

What would you now bid with each of the following five hands? 1. ♠Q74 ♠AQ ♣AKJ88 ♣5 2. ♠88 ♠A97 ♣KQJ764 ♣AK 3. ♠AKJ ♠KQ6 ♣KQ988 ♣4 4. ♠8 ♠Q88 ♣AKQJ7 ♣A74 5. ♠K3 ♠J84 ♣AKQJ848 ♣A

1. Three spades. Having already shown extra values and the great diamond length by the jump rebid to three diamonds, the secondary support for spades is now indicated. The length of North's two suits is unknown. He may have 5-5, or 5-4, or also 4-4. The delayed support for spades indicates a holding of precisely three spades. Partner can then carry on in the light of this information. The one thing to be avoided is the direct raise to four hearts. North may easily have more spades than hearts, but cannot very well have more hearts than spades. The first aim of the partnership is to reach the longer trump suit, not necessarily the stronger one. It is usually far better to select as trump a suit where the combined length is eight cards rather than one where the combined length is seven cards, even though there is greater high card strength in the shorter suit. 2. Three notrump. Since there is inadequate support for either of partner's suits and the hand lends itself to notrump play, the best picture of the hand is drawn by showing the facility to play notrump. 3. Four spades. In view of our powerful spade holding, it is extremely likely that North has at least a five-card spade suit. The second jump also shows that the three diamond bid was top-level. 4. Four hearts. Although there are potential slam possibilities, nothing more can be done at the moment. We have represented a good hand and the rest is up to partner. It must be remembered that the three diamond bid was invitational only and did not absolutely command North to bid again. Partner may have stretched a point to bid over three diamonds and should not be punished for his co-operation. 5. Five diamonds. Several purposes are simultaneously served by going directly to five diamonds. One is to impress North with the solidity of the diamond suit and show that it is independent of support. Another is to encourage partner to go on to a slam. One jump bid followed by another indicates that the first one had values in reserve. Hands of this type nearly always play better in the long, independent suit than in another length seven cards, even if split between the two hands.

WEATHER STATION

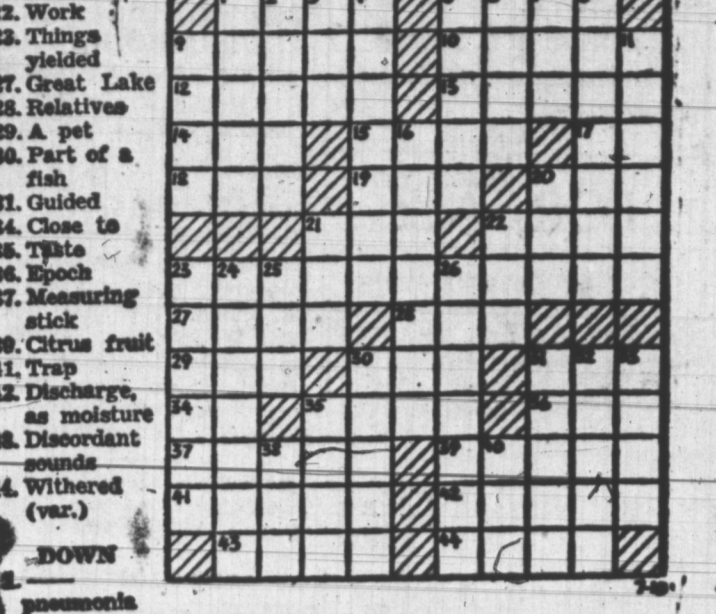
