SHIPMENTS of lobsters by steamer M. A. Starr on Thursday next will connect with S. S. Ulmida for London, leaving Halifax on the 15th inst.

POTATO bugs have made their appearance in Belle Creek, Murray River and Milton, and are reported to be increasing in numbers since first discovered.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning one drunk was fined \$4, four Scott Act cases were postponed. The case of removing the body from the Roman Catholic Cemetery was also postponed.

THERE were over one hundred sail of American fishermen anchored off Souris, yesterday. The cruisers Critic and Vigilant were also there among the fleet. The heavy northerly wind has driven the fleet round to the south side of the Island for shelter.

A CORRESPONDENT of the Pioneer writes—"Mr. Alonzo Trowsdale, of Crapaud, recently sold a very fine 'Sun Island Hero' colt to Messrs. McKee & Robins, of Beledue. Competent judges think that it will beat all comers at the Provincial Exhibition in its class, but it is not prudent to say too much until the Barristers step into the ring."

LAST week, the town of Souris had some little experience in the shape of housebreaking and thieving. Doyle & Co's store was broken into and a few articles extracted. Morrow & Co's lobster cannery was also burglarized and about forty cans of lobsters taken away. The thieves had considerable trouble in getting into the factory, having to pry off a heavy door and break fastenings. Two watchmen were inside all the time, but they did not happen to waken. A few clotheslines were also tripped the same night.

THE SCOTT ACT IN PORTLAND.—Says the Globe: The temperance party has at last concluded to test the validity of the Scott Act in Portland, and with that end in view, Mr. Amos P. Wilson, of Indiantown, acting on behalf of the committee, has entered two complaints, one against James Duffy and the other against Matthew Dalton, for selling liquor contrary to the provisions of the Canada temperance act. The cases are to be heard before Police Magistrate Tapley on Thursday next.

POISON IN THE LOBSTER.—The crews of the American schooners Ada R. Terry and Carrie E. Parsons got quite a scare on Saturday night last. They had been on shore during the evening, and seeing some lobster bodies that had been thrown out at Morrow's lobster cannery, ate some of them. Shortly after going on board, first one and then another of the crew fell sick, showing unmistakable symptoms of having partaken of poison. They became alarmed and sent ashore for medicine. After a while they became all right again, but some of them say it will be a long time before they eat any more lobster bodies.

WE are indebted to Dr. Johnson for the following mortuary statistics of the city of Charlottetown, for the month of July, 1887:—Total number of deaths, 13. In July, 1886 the number of deaths was 14; in 1885 19; in 1884, 10; in 1883, 10, an average of 13 1/5. Causes: typhoid fever, 2; Septicæmia, 1; cholera infantum, 1; erump, 1; softening of brain, 1; bronchitis, 1; consumption 3; old age, 1; accidental drowning, 1; congenital defect, 1. Ages at death: under 1 year, 1; at 2 years, 2; from 19 to 42; 6; from 65 to 68, 3; at 72, 1. Average age at death, 35 years. Sex: males, 5; females, 8. Religion: Protestants, 10; Catholics, 3. Nationality: English, 4; Scotch, 6; Irish 2; German, 1.

THE other evening a coffin was brought to Summerside in the St. Lawrence. It was billed for a station on the railway. Six men carried it carefully and reverently ashore and placed it near the baggage awaiting the train. On its arrival the conductor looked askance at the gloomy piece of freight, and began enquiring for certificate respecting the corpse. Was it smallpox or dymantite? No one knew. It was decided to leave it where it stood until it was cleared up. Just as the train moved away, however, some one discovered that the box contained nothing but some bedding, etc., which a householder was removing with other furniture to the Island. It was left standing on its head on the wharf to the horror of the uninitiated passers by.—Pioneer.

SAYS the North Sydney Herald: "What is said to be a very valuable deposit of anthracite coal has recently been discovered at Brook Village, near the village of Mabou. Mr. R. McDougall, who is one of the parties interested in this coal area, has handed us a sample of this coal. It has all the appearance of anthracite, or hard coal, and Mr. McDougall says there are three seams in close proximity to each other, and within forty feet of the surface. One seam is 4 feet in thickness, a second 6 feet, and the third seam from 8 to 9 feet, and extends about three quarters of a mile in width so far as can be discovered from the outcrops. Several experienced miners have examined the coal area, and say it is anthracite beyond a doubt.

Prices were as follows: Beef (small) 7 to 12 cents per lb.; do per qr 6 to 6 1/2; black currants per quart, 10 to 12 cents; butter, (fresh) 18 to 20 cents; butter, (tins) per lb., 16 to 18 cents; cabbage, per doz., 60 to 72 cents; ducks, per pair, 70 to 75 cents; flour, per cwt, \$2.25 to \$2.75; Gooseberries, per quart, 16 cents; hides, 6 to 6 1/2; hay per 100 lbs., 65 to 70; ham per lb., 10 to 15; lamb, per lb., 4 to 6; mutton, per lb., 5 to 8; oats, per bushel, (black, 28 to 30; oatmeal per cwt, \$2.30 to \$2.50; pork, (small) 4 to 8; pork, (carrons) per lb., none; potatoes, 45 to 50; straw per load, \$2; sheep pelts, 65 cents; \$1; wood, per load, 65 cents to \$1; eggs per doz., 12 to 14; fowls, per pair, 35 to 45; blueberries, Sets; raspberries, 10 to 12, cherries, 20 to 25 cents. The fish market was poorly attended by both dealers and buyers.

The Ring.

BOSTON, Aug. 8. The gold and diamond belt, valued at \$10,000, emblematic of the world's championship, was presented to John L. Sullivan in the Boston Theatre to-night, before an immense audience of sporting men from all parts of the country. Several sparring bouts by distinguished pugilists took place.

Mysterious Robbery.

PARIS, Aug. 8. Madame Elluini, a former queen of the operatic stage, is the victim of a mysterious highway robbery. While travelling in a coach with two attendants, a valise containing valuables said to be worth \$160,000 was stolen. A male attendant named Anda has been arrested on suspicion.

Imperial Defences.

OTTAWA, Aug. 8. Sir Adolph Caron and Sir Fred Middleton will be unable to start for British Columbia before the first week in Sept. They undertake the trip for the purpose of inspecting the site of the proposed Imperial defences there, as well as to attend the other military matters.

Great and Fatal Fire.

LONDON, Aug. 8. The fire engines are still playing on the ruins of Whitley's establishment. The loss is estimated at from £300,000 to £500,000. It is believed that four more bodies were buried. Three bodies were extracted from the ruins.

Weather Bulletin.

TORONTO, Aug. 9—10 a.m. Moderate winds, fine weather; not much change in temperature.

Writing of the export of Canadian horses to Europe, the Canadian Gazette says: "Canada must be up and doing if that important trade is not to slip through her fingers. The decision of the Imperial Government to discontinue the purchase of army remounts in Canada is a bitter disappointment, but the Gazette advocates a policy of good breeding in Canada until a permanent export horse trade be inaugurated, such as shall prove not less important to the Dominion than the present export cattle trade to England."

Referring to fishery matters, a Maine paper says: The mackerel are adding insult to injury in aggravating the scurvy trick they played on American fishermen the first of the season with their indecent haste to get into Canadian waters by huddling inside of that Kanuk dead line, the three mile limit. At Souris, P. E. I., the mackerel catch is the largest ever known, one man reeling in over 100 barrels with the first dip of a small seine, while the gaunt and hungry New England skipper is feverishly haunting the three mile limit, and gnashing his teeth at the cutters which guard it.

The Montreal Gazette remarks that the Liberals should beware of workers of the name of John. It is a bad name evidently for them. Their Johns always allow themselves to be found out. They have a long list of Johns who have played the very mischief with their pretensions to purity. There was John Currie, who, in a contested election case, said: "I entered my election outfit as missionary expenses," and came to grief. There was John Madiver, who extended that famous invitation to that other John to "come along; come along and help put down corruption; we've got lots of money." There was John Simpson, "who mesmerized them in batches of fifteen and sixteen and turned a hundred that night at the glens." Now we have John Guest, who handled the bundle in Yarmouth and gave it out in bundles of \$200 "to influence the electors in John Lovitt's favor," with the result that the second named John has been deprived of one of the seven out of twenty-one seats the Liberals held in Nova Scotia, and has barely escaped disqualification. The Liberals should beware of Johns.
