41st Annual W. I. Convention

The forty-first annual convention of the Prince Edward Island Women's Institute will begin its two day sessions this morning at Prince of Wales College Hall. During the year, three new branches have been formed at Lower Newtown, Queens County; Feakes, Kings County and Mount Herbert, Queens County. The membership on the Island now stands at 5,500 which is an increase of 500 during the past four years.

Today's morning session will include registration and the opening of the convention which will feature the address of the President, Mrs. Michael J. Doyle, North Rustico. In the afternoon the delegates will be taken on a field trip to the Experimental Farm.

At the evening meeting, which is open to the public, an address will be given by Dr. Helen C.
