Brace McKay Co. Will Begin Building New Store Monday

Brace McKay Co. Ltd., will commence construction of a modern, new steel and glass store on Monday at the corner of First and Summer Streets. Three of their nine warehouses that are to be removed from this area are presently being demolished.

Tomorrow the J and S stone is scheduled to be moved a few feet north of its present location to provide room for the new Brace McKay store which will be a one-story building, 50 x 100 feet, of steel frame construction. It's 50-foot front will be of plate glass to a height of 10 feet, fronting on Summer Street. Side walls and back will be of concrete blocks, and the basement of the entire building will be used as a showroom.

Because of the steel frame construction of the building, the main floor will not have any posts or uprights, but will be a completely open shopping area. Access to the basement showroom will be provided by a wide center staircase. Fluorescent lighting will be used throughout, and the latest heating system will provide comfortable temperatures at all times.
