SHIP COAL ALL THE YEAR.—An exchange says: A transfer boat, one year old, which was built at a cost of \$100,000, and used on the St. Lawrence has been purchased by the Dominion government for use in the Strait of Canso. Railway cars will be carried from Mulgrave to Point Tupper, the terminus of the Cape Breton Railway. This will enable coal to be shipped from the Cape Breton mines all the year round.

TENNIS.—The Tennis Courts at Victoria Park were never in better condition than they now are, and should to-morrow prove fine all tennis players—not otherwise engaged—will surely be seen "To take their stand with racquet in hand."

The Methodist Conference.

MONTREAL, Sept. 18. The Book Committee will recommend no change in the price of the Guardian but will advise that Home and School be enlarged, issued weekly and made a church organ.

The committee on the status of women in Church courts will report in favor of no change in the phraseology of discipline where the word "He" occurs.

The claim of the New Brunswick Conference to be reimbursed for the expenses of the trial of Rev. D. D. Currie was allowed to the amount of \$500.

A long debate took place on the formation of a central board for the examination of candidates for the ministry instead of one for each conference. The changes requested in the transfers were refused after a hot debate, in which a number of leading ministers and laymen took part.

The proposal to extend the term of the pastorate was lost by a vote of 104 against 131.

Trotting at New Glasgow.

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., Sept. 18. The great stallion race here this afternoon was witnessed by about 2,000 persons. The day was fine and the track perfect. There were six entries in the race, and they were placed in the following positions: Israel, owned by A. C. Bell, New Glasgow, poll; Golden, by A. N. Large, Charlottetown, second; Speculator, by Geo. Carvill, St. John, third; Peabody, by J. McKeen, Mabon, C. B., fourth; Pilot, by H. Horrill, Charlottetown, fifth; Gladstone, by James Gibson, Brooklyn, N.S., sixth. The horses were all in good trim, and after a lot of scoring got off and did splendid work, Israel winning in 2.35.

In the second heat Speculation took first place by a neck over Israel in 2.33.

The third heat was hotly contested, but Speculation broke on the first quarter and Israel was victorious in 2.37. It is said to be the finest race ever witnessed in the Provinces.

Halifax Notes.

HALIFAX, Sept. 18. The warships are to arrive from Quebec on Monday, but the grand attack on the forts, which was being looked forward to with considerably interest, will probably be abandoned.

Rumor has it that the four hundred pounds sterling, granted to the military authorities by the Imperial Government for experimenting and shamfighting, have been exhausted, and that is the reason the Admiral will be asked to forego the attack from sea.

Pickford & Black have opened negotiations with New York and Boston parties, for a steamer to take the place of the Beatrice, recently wrecked on the Nova Scotia coast, on the route for the balance of the season. The steamer was insured for about \$50,000, in European and New York offices, principally the former. A tremendous gale blew yesterday, and the steamer is now certainly a total wreck.

Reciprocity Amendment.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18. The conference on the tariff bill this morning adopted the reciprocity amendment by a party vote.
