LATEST NEWS NOTES. During 1895 there were 6,492 births, 1,398 marriages and 2,948 deaths in New Brunswick.

An uprising of Mophet, India, fanatics has assumed dangerous proportions. The British attacked a large party of them Monday and killed 100.

The strained relations exist between Spain and the United States. The sentiment of Europe seems to be hostile to the latter country's interference in Cuban matters.

A railroad convict has filed a claim against the State of Illinois for \$5,400 on the ground that his sentence was not carried out according to law. He was convicted of murder and sentenced to hard labor in the penitentiary for life. He says, however, that instead of being put at hard labor he was detailed as guard or gatekeeper, and served in that capacity for fifteen years without compensation. He demands \$30 a month for the entire period.

Governor Levi P. Morton of New York is said to be a bit vain in his personal charms. Increasing years having forced him to adopt a wig or else betray the ravages of age, he not only wears one, but four of varying lengths. HOCKEY MATCH AND RACES.

The St. Dunstan's Again Will From the Prince of Wales.

A large audience witnessed the hockey match and races at the rink last evening, and saw the Saints win from the Princes in a game that was closely contested and in every way a credit to both sides. The ice was in very good condition after the recent soft snap. Captain Weeks again referred to the satisfaction of all concerned. It was about fifteen minutes a ter tight when the hockey teams lined out in the following order:

ST. DUNSTAN'S. Goal—C. Ry. Point—G. Roy. Cover Point—C. Sullivan (Capt.) Forwards—T. Campbell, P. Duffy, P. J. Kelly, A. Sullivan.

PRINCE OF WALES. Goal—R. E. Smith. Point—W. S. Lee. Cover Point—H. Ritchie. Forwards—V. Moran (Capt.) & Doyle, P. White, N. Picard.

The Prince of Wales defended the southern goal and the Saints the northern. In the second half positions were reversed. Reilly and Picard "fazed." No material advantage was gained in the "bally," and for a time the puck was kept moving about the rink at a lively rate. It was soon seen that the Saints were in excellent condition, and were putting up a capital game. It was also noticeable that the Princes were playing much better than in the previous match, and were making it decidedly interesting for their antagonists. After about ten minutes lively play, during which there was some clever stick-work, Campbell shot the first goal and the admirers of the Saints cheered their approval. About half past their clerks had subsided, Arthur Sullivan secured another goal for the Saints, and the cheering was renewed even louder than before. The admirers of the Princes were given a chance to get in their applause a few minutes later, however, when Moran rushed the puck from the other end of the rink through the goal defended by the Saints. A few minutes later Picard shot another goal for the Princes, and again their admirers cheered loud and long. For the remainder of the half both sides played well, but neither scored. St. Dunstan's, 2; Prince of Wales, 2.

Both teams played six men in the second half. Moran had his leg hurt by a skate towards the last of the first half, and was unable to play. To even matters the Saints retired Reilly. After some good play on both sides, the Princes made sharp attack on the Saints' goal, but missed by a few inches. Thea G. R. E. Roy secured the puck, and from his position at point sent a whizzing through the Princes' goal. The Princes' goal was greeted this clever play. The admirers of each team urged them on, and the college cries were deafening. The Princes tried hard to score, but failed, and when time was called the Saints had one goal to spare. St. Dunstan's, 3; Prince of Wales, 2.

Between half time Beer and Steel and Gaudet and Carboneau started one mile match in the order named. They started from opposite sides of the rink. On the second lap Steele fell and before he pulled himself together, Beer passed him. For the rest of the race they kept well together, Beer winning by about half a lap in 4:12.

In the race between Carboneau and Gaudet, the latter got a slight lead after the first lap. On the third lap Carboneau stumbled, and Gaudet seized his lead and first lap. For several laps they kept together, but finally Gaudet passed Carboneau and landed a winner by a little over half a lap. Time, 4:02.

Gaudet's Band furnished choice music during the evening.

LOOKING TOWARDS P. E. I.

WASHINGTON, March 5.—It has been learned that the British ambassador here, Sir Julian Pauncefote, and the Venezuelan minister in this city, Senor Arzade, have entered into direct negotiations for a settlement of the Zuzan incident which involved the arrest of a British police official in the territory in dispute between Venezuela and Great Britain, the hauling down of the British flag and a subsequent demand for an indemnity upon the part of Great Britain.
