

Islanders Even Series With Atlantics

Score 6-2 Victory Last Night At Forum; Third Encounter Here Tonight

A hard fighting band of Islanders led by a courageous coach, supported by a team who worked their hearts out, were able to avenge the defeat of the night before by trouncing the Halifax Atlantics to the score of 6-2 last night.

The game which was almost two hours late in starting gave some 3,000 fans one of the most thrilling spectacles of hockey since many a day at the Charlottetown Forum. Both teams came up with some brilliant hockey and neither spared their body checks with the Islanders handing out a more generous supply than their opponents. Clements, who joined the A's for the playoffs, met a hot reception from his former teammates and was the target of some crushing body checks. A total of 18 penalties were handed out by referees Couture and Elliot with the locals getting 10 and Halifax eight.

The game was well handled but some of the decisions by Elliot met with disapproval from both teams. The Islanders' attacks were well organized and the defence gave Roger Bessette a good protection throughout the game. The stiff body checks handed out at the Island blue line discouraged many a Halifax player from carrying in too deep. Ford was closely watched and the league leading scorer was kept to one goal. McMeekin in the Halifax cage came up with some marvellous saves and was a busy man stopping the goal hungry Charlottetown players.

Buck Whitlock showed to no uncertain degree why he has been four times top scorer in the M.M. H.L. when he figured in five of his team's goals. Playing with Carver and Palladino, this trio executed plays which were a treat to watch. The line of Robert, Gignac and Laliberte gave a very good account of themselves and on many occasions were close to scoring. Coach Trainor played a good deal with Ritchie and Saindon and were most effective every minute they were on the ice.

The defence quartet left nothing to be desired with Gustavson and McLaughlin handing out the body checks and Gray and O'Connor making some very fast rushes. Roger Bessette although not called upon to make as many stops as his opponent, handled some very difficult shots which were certainly goal labelled.

Halifax forced the play at the opening whistle and kept the Islanders inside their own blue line for the first two minutes. Gustavson handed a heavy check to Ford and shortly after O'Connor and Clements started roughing and were chased to the penalty box. Trainor dumped Bloom along the end of the rink and very quickly turned his attention to McNeill with whom he began to rough it up. Before the smoke of battle cleared two players from each team were allowed to cool off. These penalties were followed quickly by one to Clements at 5:20 and Carver and Wywrot at 5:50. At the 6:14 mark a play engineered by Trainor and Whitlock was converted when McLaughlin fired a screen shot to beat McMeekin all the way.

Less than a minute later with the Islanders pressing the Hal-

fax goalie, Whitlock made a perfect passout to Gray who with his bullet shot sent one into the Halifax net which was not seen by the goalie. Islanders still pressed for more goals and the Atlantics at this time resorted to shooting the puck up the ice. Carver got an elbowing penalty at 11:48 and Trainor with Tiger Ritchie did yeomanlike service in keeping the A's off the score sheet. Just before the period ended O'Connor made a solo rush which was stopped only at the goal crease. Ford scored the first Halifax goal unassisted with only 25 seconds remaining in the period. The fleet winger came in first but was steered to the corner by Big Gus but he wormed his way clear to pick up a loose puck and bang it behind Bessette.

Two penalties to Palladino and McLaughlin at 1:44 started off the second period. McLaughlin received a 10 minute misconduct in this deal for arguing too strenuously with the referee over his team mate's sentence. This time Trainor and Robert held the fort while short handed Saindon got a breakaway at the ten minute mark but Bloom got back in time to crash him heavily to the ice.

A masterful play marked the Islanders' fifth goal as Palladino carried the puck into Halifax territory; he faked a pass and then fired a hard one at Roy McMeekin. Whitlock was "Johnnie on the spot" to scoop up the rebound.

Little Muckle Hollett who played an outstanding game, scored the second and final goal for Halifax when he took McNeill's pass to drive a hard one between Bessette's pads. It was a well earned goal and could not have come to more deserving players.

The whole period marked a better brand of hockey as players forgot about the rough stuff and settled down to real playing. A terrific check was handed Clements by Gustavson at the three-quarter mark which almost lifted the former Charlottetown player over the boards.

Joe Lepine got a penalty early in the third period and a breakaway by Robert almost connected but Bloom, who played a very fine game for the losers, brought the Island centre down heavily at the blue line. At 10:37 the Halifax captain was caught holding Whitlock as he attempted to go in on goal and was sent to the sin bin.

Perhaps the happiest man coming off the ice last night was Claude Robert who was able to redeem a heart-breaking effort by scoring a goal less than a minute after he had been plainly out-guessed by the Halifax goalie. The fleet centre player had gotten a clean breakaway and was right in on McMeekin who outfoxed him. Robert's chance came when Palladino pushed a pass from the corner which Claude was quick to bang home.

The final goal of the evening was another of those Whitlock-Carver-Palladino picture plays, with Carver carrying the puck over the blue line; he passed to Whitlock who in turn shoved it ahead to Vip, with the latter finishing the play.

The fight of the evening occurred at 18:35 between Bucko Trainor and Pete Wywrot. The latter who is ordinarily a mild mannered chap, seemed to be ready for a fist encounter all evening and after a prolonged argument between

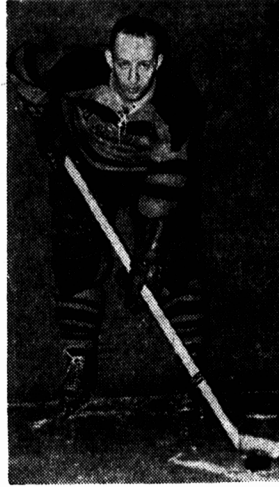
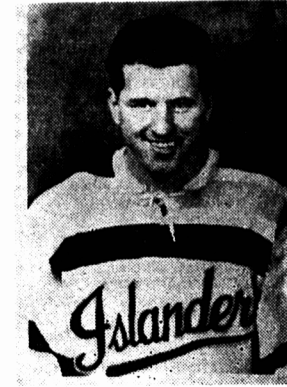

GLACE BAY, N.S. (CP)—Sydney Millionaires deadlocked their Maritime Major Hockey League best-of-nine semi-finals 1-1 Wednesday night by defeating Glace Bay Miners 4-1.

Glace Bay, however, have announced that they are protesting the manner in which the referees, Jim Kelly and Mike Choma, handled the game.

Sydney scored two unanswered goals in the first period and Glace Bay scored the lone goal in the second. Sydney added two more in the third.

Charlie Marshall and Gordie Cowan each picked up a goal and an assist for Sydney while Lorne Pirie and Duke McDonald added the others. Gordie Myles scored the Glace Bay goal.

Both teams played wide-open hockey in the first period. In the closing minutes of that period Jim Gray Renaud of Sydney and Frank Arnett each drew majors for fighting.

The penalty parade continued in the second period with Miners' Ray Farrell being handed a match misconduct when he argued on a penalty given teammate Arnett midway through the session. Three minors were called in the third.

Norm Defelice turned aside 38 shots for Sydney while Cliff Hicks handled 33. The teams play tonight at Sydney.
