Mrs. Gordon Stewart, who escaped from the early Sunday morning fire in a Water Street apartment house started last night, said she and her husband discovered the fire, that awakened their five-year old daughter.

Her husband, she said, tore out a sash and told her to jump, which she did. Mrs. Stewart said their daughter was frightened and wouldn't jump but her father pushed the child out the second floor window and neighbors caught her as she fell.

Mr. Stewart then jumped out himself. Mrs. Stewart said the neighbors also helped to break her fall when she jumped.

One of the neighbors, James Poulton, in trying to reach high enough to catch the little girl's legs as she clung to the window sill, slipped and fell and cut his hand when he broke a downstairs window.

However, Mr. Stewart who was behind the little girl in the same room was able to push the terrified child free of the sill and she was caught by those below.

He then jumped out himself.

At no time, Mrs. Stewart said, did she and her husband know the child behind in the burning house.
