PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

MONDAY, MA. 15.

House met at 5 15. Mr. Bice asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the Government to place winches on the Mill River Bridge during this season, to lift the iron when required. Hon Mr McLean said that some winches had been sent up, but the chain had not been broken. On motion of Hon. Mr. McLean the act respecting the village of Souris was read a third time and passed. On motion of Mr. D. A. McKinnon the bill incorporating the Montague Electric Company was read a third time and passed. On motion of Hon. Mr. Rogers the act amending the City of Charlottetown Incorporation Act was read a third time and carried. On motion of Hon. Mr. Rogers the act amending the public schools act was re-committed and amended and set down for third reading to-morrow. At the evening session, upon motion of Hon. Mr. Rogers, the bill incorporating the Masonic Temple Company was read a second time, Mr. Forbes occupying the chair. Reported agreed to and set down for third reading to-morrow. Hon. Mr. Farquharson introduced a bill to amend an act taxing certain incorporated companies and associations. Second reading to-morrow. On motion of Mr. A. Peters committee on the bill regarding assignments for the benefit of creditors was resumed, Mr. Forbes taking the chair. The bill was reported agreed to and set down for third reading to-morrow. On motion of Hon. H. C. Macdonald the act amending 61 Victoria chapter 3 was read a first time and set down for second reading to-morrow. On motion of Hon. Mr. Farquharson the House resumed committee on the bill incorporating the Prince Edward Island Dairy Association, Mr. Reid in the chair. The bill was reported agreed to with amendments and set down for third reading to-morrow. This bill provides for the incorporation of an association to consist of a board of seven provisional directors, one delegate from each butter or cheese factory, and any person paying a membership fee of one dollar per year. The association will have the power to levy an assessment on the factories in proportion to the milk obtained, the total assessment to amount to \$600. The association has power to appoint an instructor to visit the several factories, and to defray his duties. The instructor shall report to the president of the respective factories and also the central association the condition of the various factories, and make such suggestions as he may from time to time deem fit in order to render more perfect the output of the factories. Mr. D. A. McKinnon moved the third reading of the bill respecting the practice of medicine and surgery. Mr. M. Mackinnon moved in amendment that the bill be re-committed for the insertion of an amendment to subsection 10 providing for the striking out of the words "an academic" and exempting a teacher of the first-class from passing a matriculation examination. The amendment was adopted (D. A. McKinnon and Rogers voting against it) and the bill was set down for third reading to-morrow. Mr. Farquharson presented an act amending the act providing for the building of the Prince of Wales college and Normal School. Second reading to-morrow. Hon. Mr. Macdonald presented a bill relating to dowry. Second reading to-morrow. House adjourned.

Local and Other Items.

SCOTT ACT.—The Scott Act case against John G. Scrimgeour was yesterday further adjourned until next Monday. BIG CATCH OF LOBSTERS.—A splendid catch of lobsters is reported to have been made at Morell yesterday. The traps at Mr. McEwen's factory are said to have averaged twelve lobsters each. THE JACQUES CARTIER.—The Jacques Cartier arrived from Pictou yesterday at 7 o'clock. The Princess will probably come off the slip to-morrow morning, and will come over from Pictou to-morrow afternoon as usual. SONS OF ENGLAND.—Lodges Ebon and Prince Edward, headed by the Artillery Band, will parade on Sunday morning next to the Baptist church where an appropriate sermon will be preached by the pastor, Rev. G. C. P. Raymond. CHOICE CATTLE.—Mr. William Ross, an enterprising farmer and stock-raiser on West River, brought seven choice cattle into the city on Saturday last which he sold to Thorne Bros. The aggregate weight was 6021 pounds. The cattle were greatly admired. THE CAMPANA.—The Campana arrived in port this morning at about 5 o'clock, with a full general cargo. She left for Souris and Pictou at noon and will return here tomorrow. From here she will sail for Summerside and Montreal. There were no passengers either way. AN AMERICAN TUG.—The Thomas J. Scully, a large American tug, came into port for coal and water at about seven o'clock last evening. She came hither from New York and will probably sail tomorrow morning for Lake Champlain, where parties have purchased her for use on the lakes. KILLED BY A ROLLER.—A young man named William Blackie, of Upper Wicklow, Carleton Co., N. B., met with a fatal accident on Tuesday last. He was engaged in rolling some land and was seated upon a heavy roller, which passed over his body, crushing him badly. The unfortunate young man lived only a few hours after the accident. SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—The fraternal visit of Prince Edward to Victoria Division last evening was a pleasant affair. Bro. J. L. Godkin on behalf of Victoria Division extended a cordial welcome to the visiting Division, which was responded to by Brother A. Down. The programme consisted of select readings, instrumental and vocal music, and short addresses. The meeting was brought to a close shortly before ten o'clock, all "happy to meet, sorry to part, but happy to meet again."

SEWERAGE CONSTRUCTION.—Work on the sewerage construction commences tomorrow morning. Mr. T. A. McLean will commence work on his contract, at the corner of Great George and Sydney Streets, with about thirty men. Messrs. Scott and McKinnon, with about the same number of men, will commence work on their contract at the corner of Hillsborough and Richmond Streets. Both of the contractors expect to employ considerably over one hundred men during the summer, and they will each, probably, work them in four sections. THE HALIFAX.—The steamer Halifax, of the Plant Line, arrived here, on her first trip of the season, this morning at ten o'clock. Captain Pye, Mr. Ellis, 1st officer, Mr. Cook, the Purser, Mr. Noyes, the Steward and the other officers were given a hearty welcome back to Charlottetown, by a large number of friends who were at the wharf. 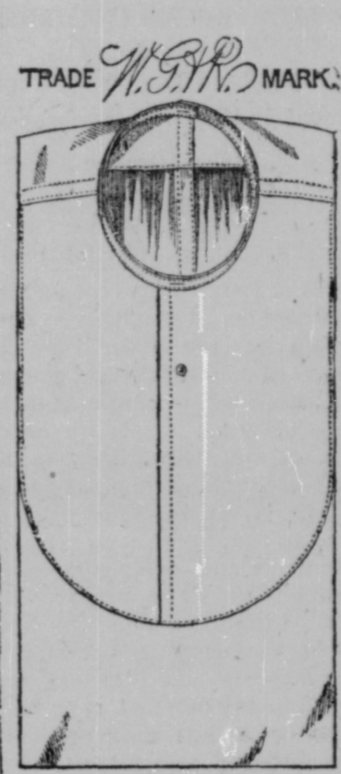

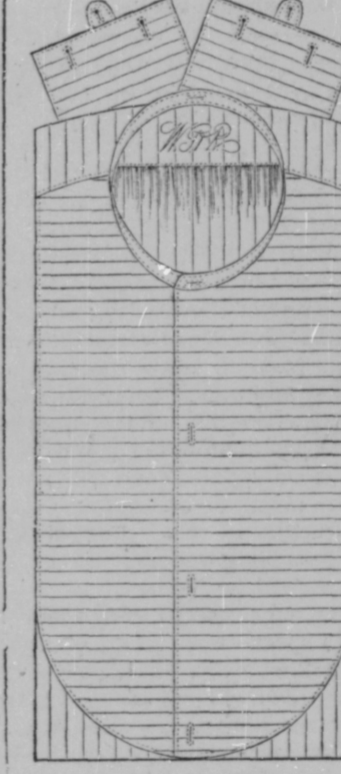
