Souris Notes.

The cheese factory boom still prevails. The adjourned meeting held in Agricultural Hall on Thursday evening was fairly well attended. Mr. Albert Mooney, of Little Harbor, occupied the chair. The Rev. Father McDermid, who is taking a leading part in the movement, was unavoidably absent owing to the death of his father. The meeting, however, was ably addressed by the Rev. Father Walker, of Rollo Bay, and others, all in favor of commencing operations, now that the necessary amount of stock has been taken up and the milk of over four hundred cows promised, at as early a date as practicable. It is not quite clear yet whether this and other proposed factories throughout the country will receive the same privileges and advantages from the Government as were granted to the one at New Perth last year. There are a good many who think that all Island cheese factories should be regarded as experimental ones, and treated as liberally by the Government as was the one at New Perth at the start.

Colville schoolhouse is to be enlarged. A meeting of the rate payers took place on Thursday, when it was decided to build an additional wing to the schoolhouse for the accommodation of the younger portion of the pupils. This speaks well for the rate payers and augurs still further success for a school that already rates among the foremost in the county. By the way, as residents of Charlottetown and Summerside are having schools started on the kindergarten system, now is a very suitable time for the villagers of Souris to move the same direction.

In the hall of the W. O. T. U. on Saturday evening last, Mr. Fearon, principal of the Halifax Institution for the Deaf and Dumb, and four of his pupils held a meeting of a most interesting character. Mr. Cullen, teacher of Colville grammar school occupied the chair. The hall was crowded, all three resident clergymen of the place being present in the audience. Mr. Fearon who appears to be a worthy successor of his gifted predecessor, Princip. Hutton, began his address by briefly referring to deaf mute education from its inception to the present day, describing the two systems, manual and oral, the latter of which is now being taught in all cases where the organs of speech are present. He showed by the pupils present, one of whom, Maurice Burke, is a native of Mitchell River, P. E. I., what can be done towards making the deaf to speak, and it was truly marvelous to hear even the smallest boy among them, a little over seven years of age, an orphan who, as the Principal stated, has no friend on earth to care for him but the Institution, pronounce words almost as distinctly as if he had his hearing. The ready answers on the backboard by the older boys to questions asked by the chairman in geography, history and general topics evinced quickness of perception and knowledge of subjects remarkable indeed. The recitation of the Lord's Prayer by one of the pupils at the close of the exercises, impressed all present with the solemnity of the great and good work in which teachers of deaf-mutes are engaged. Revs. J. G. Cameron, J. Goldsmith and Mr. J. G. Stearns then addressed the meeting, eulogizing the Halifax Institution for the noble work it has already done, and is still doing, for the deaf mutes not only of Nova Scotia but also of this Province. A collection was taken in aid of the Institution.
