**PREMIER MACDONALD COLONEL.**—A Winnipeg despatch says: Premier Hugh John Macdonald has accepted the position of lieutenant colonel of the new Winnipeg regiment, to be known as the Winnipeg Light Infantry. There are now 397 men enrolled and there will be eight companies and a full regimental band. The uniform will consist of red and blue pants with red stripes.

**A RUMOR CONCERNING HALIFAX.**—It is rumored that the military authorities have received orders from the war office to strengthen the fortifications of Halifax, but the rumor cannot be confirmed. Several military men have been questioned but they all profess ignorance of the order, and deny that any such was received.

**RAVAGES OF PNEUMONIA.**—The list of deaths from pneumonia continues to increase, and its ravages in this latitude were never more prevalent than now. In this connection it is interesting to note that this disease was the cause of more deaths in Boston last year than any other single disease in the whole category. Hitherto consumption has held this place, but it has now yielded to pneumonia, the deaths from this cause in Boston last year numbering no less than 1,455, as against 1,236 deaths from consumption, which stands next in the list.—Boston Herald.

**Local and Other Items.**

**CANADIAN SCOUTS.**—A number of Canadians, including two experienced scouts, have arrived at Cape Town, and have offered their services as scouts. They have paid their own expenses and say there are hundreds anxious to follow.

**THE FAMINE IN INDIA.**—About 23,000,000 persons in British territory and about 2,000,000 in the native states are afflicted with the dread famine. The Viceroy, Lord Curzon, says the famine area has expanded, surpassing the worst fears. They are now facing a cattle water and food scarcity of a terrible character. About 3,250,000 are already receiving relief.

**SOCIAL AND ENTERTAINMENT.**—A pie social and entertainment will be held in Hunter River hall, on Friday, February 2nd, under the auspices of Court Dalvay, 811, C. O. F. Rev. **WAS ALSO STRICKEN.**—A strange story comes from Chicago. John Alexander Dowie, proprietor of the City of Perfect Goodness, to be founded near Chicago, found himself suddenly unable to speak while he was making the opening prayer in his church in that city on Sunday, the 7th of January. When a few months ago the late Mr. Moody's voice failed him, Mr. Dowie—who had not approved the work of the evangelist—exclaimed, standing on the same spot where he himself was stricken, "The Almighty has silenced Mr. Moody in direct answer to my prayer."

**MOURNING ENVELOPES FORBIDDEN.**—Henceforth mourning envelopes are not to pass through the French post. The notepaper may have as deep an edge as the sender desires, but the cover must be white, or may be tinted, but is not to have a black edge. It is not that the department is out of sympathy with the expression of mourning by means of a stationery; on the contrary, the sending of mourning cards is a decided source of revenue. It is that experience has shown the postoffice authorities that mourning envelopes are easily tampered with. They can be opened, and if the gummed edge is torn or frayed in the process a little wax rubbed over the black surface makes everything look all right. A white envelope so interfered with would tell its own tale.

**THE YOUNG MEN'S DEBATING CLUB AT MURRAY HARBOR.**—On the 30th ult., a number of young men assembled in Temperance Hall and organized a debating society, the object of which is to provide both entertainment and instruction for the young men during the winter. The officers for the present term are as follows: President, Wm H Bull; vice president, Jas McKay; secretary, Wm J Haberlin; Treasurer, Herbert Moore; sergeant-at-arms, James E Gillis. Also a membership committee of five members, and an executive committee of five members. The society meets every Wednesday evening, and a number of applicants were enrolled the last two meetings. The debates so far have been spirited and animated. The debate for next meeting is: "Which has done the more for civilization, the sword or the pen." The officers for the ensuing month will then be elected, and some more candidates enrolled.

**NOTE.**—The names of applicants must be given to the membership committee, and if favorably reported may be enrolled by complying with the demands of the constitution and bye-laws of the society.

**THE WOOD TRADE.**—From J. B. Snowball's wood trade circular for 1899 we gather that the shipments from the Miramichi for the year amounted to 129,000,000 superficial feet, which was an advance over last year. The exports from St. John, however, show a slight decrease as do also the shipments from nearly all the other New Brunswick ports. St. John report is for the twelve months, from 1st December, 1898. The stock of merchantable spruce and pine wintering at Miramichi is 31,684,000 superficial feet, against 40,000,000 last year. The increased shipments from Miramichi the past season represent the difference between the stock wintering in the fall of 1898 and the present stocks. The shipments from Nova Scotia show a falling off of over 20,000,000 superficial feet, and 57,000,000 superficial feet less than in 1897. This was no doubt partly caused by the larger quantity taken by the United States market, and from present appearances that market will draw still more heavily on Nova Scotia next year. All the mills in the Miramichi district were fully employed the past season. At present there is nothing to indicate that an increased quantity will be manufactured. The opening spring rates of freight ranged from 43 9 to 47 6, according to size of vessel and port of destination. Later freights were from 50 upwards, and in one case as high as 70 was paid for a small steamer, Miramichi to Rochefort.
