Church opened.—The new Presbyterian Church at Murray River was opened for public worship on Sunday last. The three services held were largely attended. The collection was very good.

Island Steamers.—The St. Lawrence left Pictou for Charlottetown at half-past one this afternoon. The Northumberland left Summerside at the usual hour.

Police Court.—This forenoon, Peter Kelly confessed to a first contravention of the Canada Temperance Act, and was fined in the sum of \$50 and \$250 or two months imprisonment. He paid the fine. One drunk was fined \$1 or 4 days.

Accident to the boiler.—Owing to an accident to the boiler in the Full Electric Light Station yesterday afternoon, merchants and others using that light were left without it last evening. It is expected that the boiler will be ready for use by to-morrow evening.

Detained by the storm.—The steamer Fastnet, which arrived in Summerside from Halifax about one o'clock this morning, is detained at that port by the prevailing snowstorm. She will leave Summerside for Charlottetown as soon as it clears up.

Sale in St. Peter's Schoolroom.—The Young People's Working Society of St. Peter's Church will hold a sale of fancy goods, aprons, &c., in the Schoolroom on Wednesday, the 5th Dec. There will be 5 o'clock tea, and a second-hand book table, also a box of goods from England to be disposed of. Sale will begin at 3 o'clock. Admission 5 cents.

Another Very Sudden Death.—We greatly regret to hear of the sudden death of Mrs. Lennet Hyde, which occurred at her residence, Cornwall, this morning, shortly after she came down stairs. Mr. Hyde, as far as the Examiner can learn, was in her usual health up to the time of the unfortunate occurrence. She was a daughter of the late John McCallum, of Olive River, and was about thirty-six years of age. Her husband and relatives have the sympathy of all in their bereavement.

Fatal Accident.—A sad death occurred at Alberton last week, as the result of an accidental fall from the stair rail of the High School there, by a young lad named Dhan. Like many venturesome youngsters, he was "riding" on the rail, when he lost his hold and fell a distance of fifteen or twenty feet, receiving injuries from which he never recovered. The school was thrown into general gloom on account of the death of the unfortunate scholar. He was about 10 years of age.

Another lad named Laird had his leg broken at Alberton on Thursday last, attempting to climb up on a moving wagon and getting his leg caught in the wheel.

The Rink to be Opened.—The fact that the Hillsborough Skating Rink has been leased for the winter by Messrs. B. Dawson and George Rogers, and that it is to be opened as usual, will be welcome news to the skaters of the town. There are to be two hand nights—Monday and Thursday of each week—and every other Saturday afternoon will be relieved by music. Tickets are to be reduced from the old price, and the rink will be opened for skating about Christmas, weather permitting. Under the management of the lessees, we look forward to a good season. That the rink will be well patronized is almost a certainty, under the new management which will go into force when skating begins.

Ye Olden Times.—In "the good old days" the Latin proverb, "De mortuis nil nisi bonum," was apparently not always noted upon. In the number of the Royal Gazette for February 1, 1831, after a notice of the death of a native of Preston, the following information, which must have had an especial interest for the surviving relatives of the deceased: "For the last 24 years he has been a resident in Charlottetown, and, until he abandoned himself to dissipation, was a person in good circumstances. For many years past, however, he barely contrived to ek out a miserable existence by mending windows, carrying water, and performing menial offices of that kind, and was scarcely, by any chance, ever seen sober." Of another person, who took too much gin and died while under its influence, the verdict of the coroner's jury was that he died by the visitation of God, through the effects of intoxication.
