Federal Divorce Law Probe

Is Promised From Ground Up

OTTAWA (CP)—"We will go into the matter from the ground up," says A. J. P. Cameron, a lawyer-MP who is organizing the first federal inquiry into divorce laws in 99 years.

Mr. Cameron (L., Toronto High Park) is chairman of the Commons Law Committee, which will open public hearings soon on various proposals to widen the grounds for divorce and make other changes. Justice Minister Gardin has said public opinion on divorce has changed considerably in recent years and the government will watch the justice committee inquiry closely.

Federal Divorce Law Probe

Eight MPs have introduced private member's bills to establish new grounds for divorce, such as desertion, separation, cruelty, criminal behavior, alcoholism, drug addiction, non-support and incurable mental illness. Adultery is the main ground for divorce in Nova Scotia. Cruelty is a rarely-invoked additional ground.

MP FOR 11 YEARS - Mr. Cameron, 70, has been an MP 11 years and presided over a committee that held intensive hearings on the Canada Pension Plan a year ago. A Presbyterian and Mason, he has been married to the former Beatrice Beckett of Toronto for 42 years and they have a married daughter.

One of his law partners in the firm of Cameron, Weldon, Brown, McCullum and Skells is Andrew Brewin, MP for Toronto Greenwood and a New Democratic Party representative on the justice committee. The committee is composed almost entirely of lawyers, has 13 Liberals including Mr. Cameron, eight Conservatives, two New Democrats and one Creditist—Raymond Langlois of Megantic.

The Conservative members include former justice minister David Fulton, former immigration minister Richard Bell and Erik Nielsen (Yukon). The NDP member is David Lewis (York South). Nine committee members, including vice-chairman Yves Forest (L., Stanstead), are from Quebec, which has refused since Confederation to set up its own divorce courts. Quebec residents can apply to the Senate for divorce on the ground of adultery.

A similar situation applies for residents of Newfoundland, which also has no divorce court. Eleven committee members list themselves as Roman Catholics, four as Anglicans and four as United Church.

TORONTO (CP)—The Canadian Tax Foundation Wednesday forecast that the federal government will face a deficit of between \$438,000,000 and \$588,000,000 in the fiscal year ending March 31, 1967.

In its annual study of the outlook for the next federal budget—expected within a month—the foundation predicts revenues will rise by about \$431,000,000 during the fiscal year, compared with the \$500,000,000 apparently recorded during the fiscal 1967 to \$8,112,000,000.

NO TAXES FORECAST - The foundation is a non-profit organization sponsored by the Canadian Bar Association and the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants. Its annual outlook makes no attempt to predict possible tax changes. The review says that although former finance minister Gordon forecast a deficit of \$300,000,000 for this year in his budget last April 26, it now appears the deficit would be not more than \$50,000,000.

SHOWS PRICE IMPACT

One major unknown factor the foundation comments on is a possible price increase of about three per cent, which it says could have a significant effect on revenues.

SHOWS PRICE IMPACT

"If it triggers off restrictive measures either in Canada or the United States it could result in the failure of the economy to achieve the rate of real growth implicit in the GNP projection. This would in turn have serious effects on all the revenue forecasts."

SHOWS PRICE IMPACT

Other imponderables mentioned include the effect on capital investment in Canada of the United States economic guidelines, the fighting in Viet Nam, possible substantial gains from the U.S.-Canada auto agreement and incentive programs to stimulate employment.

SHOWS PRICE IMPACT

It expects the biggest revenue increases to come from sales taxes—a gain of about \$117,000,000.
