## Potato Earnings Said Cut By Half

GUARDIAN-PATRIOT CAPITAL BUREAU OTTAWA — The extent to which the decline in the return from Prince Edward Island potatoes cut back the total farm cash income for the province in 1961 has just been estimated by the Bureau of Statistics.

Canada's two "potato provinces", P.E.I. and New Brunswick, were the only ones to show declines for the year, with all other provinces registering gains.

Cash income from potatoes on the island in 1961 is figured as 49 per cent below the level in 1960.

With the whole decline more than accounted for by the drop in potato returns, preliminary figures for 1961 farm operations on the island indicate that total cash income was \$24,307,000. This total is about 17 per cent under the figure of \$29,110,000 in 1960 and also under the \$28,207,000 in 1959.

## P.E.I. To Benefit Indirectly From Spud Sale To Europe

Commenting Monday on recent shipments of 800,000 bags of potatoes from New Brunswick to European markets, Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said that the price received by growers was 84 cents per 75 pound bag "which was almost equal to our price here."

He said that the added cost of moving potatoes to Saint John by land growers would have had the effect of making the export deal too costly for local growers.

Mr. MacRae pointed out however that this province benefits

from the sale of potatoes to Europe. The minister added that potato prices are improving. Growers are getting 40 cents per 75-pound bag.

### Several Jerseys Qualified In Record Of Performance

Country View Adeline, a three-year-old Jersey cow owned by Fred Coles, Milton, stood second in her class in Canada for the period reported in record of performance tests in the current Canadian Jersey Breeder. She produced 9,415 pounds milk, 338 fat for breed class averages, 134 in milk, 147 butterfat.

Country View Spotty produced 8,963 milk, 490 fat for BCAs of 121 and 123 as a four-year-old and Philadelphia Virginia produced 8,567 milk, 481 fat for BCAs of 113 and 120 in the mature class for the same owner.

E.A. Myers, Hazelbrook had several cows qualify. They included River North Betty with 10,843 milk, 509 fat for BCAs of 143 and 126 and Myersbrook Molly's Dream with 9,388 milk, 504 fat for BCAs of 118 and 124 as mature cows and Edgemoor Anne Irene with 8,867 milk, 386 fat for BCAs of 117 and 122 as a junior two-year-old.

George Macmillan, C.R.N. also had several qualify. They included Macwin General Kate with 6,618 milk, 166 fat and Macwin General Kathy with 7,442 milk, 478 fat as mature cows. Others included Maryvill Dreaming Lucy with 8,367 milk, 37 fat for BCAs of 113 and 138 as a senior four-year-old and Keppoch Jess's Katrina with 6,346 milk, 463 fat as a mature cow.

### Gov't Will Name Housing Board

A seven-man board of directors for the province's Senior Citizens Housing Corporation is expected to be appointed at Thursday's meeting of the government's Executive Council.

Welfare and Labor Minister Henry Wedge said yesterday that the government recently picked the board members and the members have consented to act. The appointments will be made official Thursday.

The corporation was set up at the last session of the Legislature to supervise the provision of low-rental housing for senior citizens.

Mr. Wedge said it is expected that a new provincial labor relations board will also be appointed before the end of the session of the Legislature, wiped out the former board. According to Mr. Wedge, it is just a formality to appoint a new board and the board will consist of the same members, with the possible exception of one person.
