Strange But True

One should never refer to clocks and watches as "time-keepers," as these nor anything else can keep time or stop it. Clocks and watches are able to measure time by telling how rapidly it moves, so that we may regulate our movements and occupations to conform to its flight. So watches and clocks are time-measures.
