Fellow Workers Take Up Collection To Transport Family From Crete To USA

SALT LAKE CITY, (AP)—Mike Katsanevas doesn't say much when asked what he's going to get for Christmas. He just wipes his eyes, tries a smile, and tries to explain: "Only in America could such a thing happen like this. For Mike is going to get the best Christmas present in the world—his family. His fellow workers at the Clearfield naval supply depot are taking up a \$3,000 collection to bring seven members of Mike's family to America from Crete."

Mike, a 66-year-old janitor, was saving his pay to bring the rest of his family to America. Last week a spontaneous campaign started among Mike's 2,100 fellow workers to help him do it. In less than a week \$2,100 of the needed \$3,000 was collected.

Mike first came to America from Crete 35 years ago. He enlisted in the army in the First World War and with his mustering out pay he started a small restaurant in Salt Lake City.

WIFE DIED

In 1924 he returned to Crete to see his dying mother. He married, and returned to his coffee shop. But his wife died in childbirth, and Mike, grief stricken, went back again to Crete. He farmed the small family olive grove, remarried, and started raising a family.

Came tragedy again. The Germans invaded Greece. Mike fought for his country, ended up in prison. When he was released his family was near starvation, his home had been burned, his olive grove despoiled.

When Congress passed a law allowing all former American soldiers stranded in Europe free transportation back to the United States Mike got together enough money to bring two sons and a daughter.

MINE SALT WITH PIPES AND WATER ABOVE GROUND IN NOVA SCOTIA

NAPPAN, N. S. (CP) — Ninety men with some water and pipes prove that working in the salt mines isn't as tough as it's said to be.

The 90 comprise the labor force at the Maritime plant of the Dominion Salt Company Ltd. here, which actually isn't a mine at all. Sixty thousand tons of salt a year are being taken from veins far below ground through use of the pipes and water.

BRINY PRODUCT

A double-walled pipe, or a pipe within a pipe, is sunk into the underground salt deposits. Ordinary water is pumped down the "outside" pipe under pressure and drawn up the inside pipe, laden with the salt dissolved in it at the bottom.

The brine is evaporated and the salt is processed into grades suitable for table use, meat packing, canned, fish packing and for mixing with ice in cold storage plants.

The brine is so laced with salt that it's almost slush. The concentration of 26 per cent makes sea water's three per cent pale by comparison. A gallon of this brine will yield three pounds of salt.

Salt destined for table use has to be treated with magnesium carbonate powder to make it "free running."

Another item that must be added to table salt is iodine. This is required by federal law.

HEALTHY INDUSTRY

The company declines to define its operation in terms of dollars and cents. But its above-average wage rates have made it one of the healthiest industries in northern Nova Scotia. The "mine" is about five miles from the manufacturing town of Amherst.

The Nappan branch of the company was opened in 1947. The others are at Goderich and Sarnia, Ont., and Unity, Sask. The water-and-pipe method of producing salt is used in all four of them.

Packaging is a major part of the operation. The company found that table salt put up in a square carton seemed to sell better in the province of Quebec than it did in a round container. So Quebec wholesalers get their salt "square."

REFUGEE IS SPY

BERLIN (AP)—A youth who fled to Allied West Berlin last month and claimed he was a deserting East German fighter pilot was arrested Friday as a Communist spy. West Berlin police said 20-year-old Horst Becker confessed that his previous story was a hoax and that he had been sent to the West as an agent for the East German state security police.

Give Oxygen To Former Film Star

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP)—An emergency rescue squad administered oxygen to ailing film star Mary Pickford last Monday night. It was disclosed Thursday. But she dismisses it as only an attack of indigestion.

The 61-year-old Toronto-born actress' name came up on a police report of the incident. The report stated that an inhalator squad was summoned to her Pickford estate at 7:42 p.m. Monday and administered oxygen to the star for 22 minutes.

The report described the call as routine and said the victim was having difficulty in breathing. "It was nothing," she laughed when questioned by a reporter. "I

had a little attack of indigestion and it worried by husband. That's all. I feel fine." She is married to Buddy Rogers, also an old-time star.
