NATO Meeting Set For May 22

OTTAWA (CP)—A three-day ministerial meeting of the NATO alliance, already the subject of hot political controversy in Canada, is scheduled to open here May 22.
Announcement of the opening date was made here by the external affairs department.
More than 700 persons from the 14 other member-nations of NATO are expected to come to Canada for the sessions which normally are held about every six months and rotate among the capitals. Included will be 200 to 300 news correspondents.

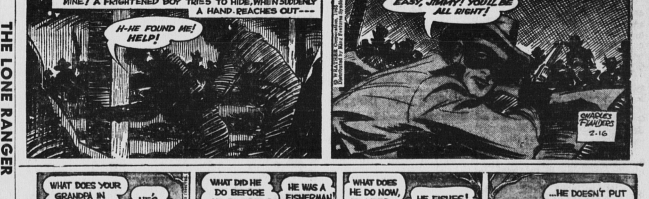
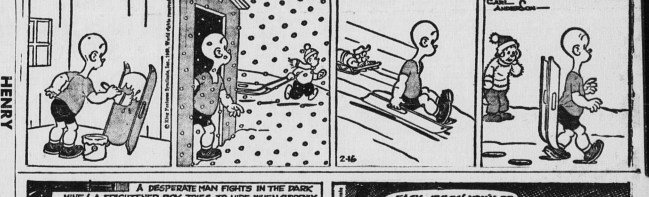
