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## THE TRURO ACCIDENT.

Record of a Reckless Man.

TRURO, July 29.—Fred Mitchell, who fell from the Folly Railway Bridge a few days ago a distance of 90 feet has been getting worse and at the time of writing the physicians in attendance had not given any opinion as to his recovery.

The men with whom the unfortunate young man was working were unaware that any accident had happened until they heard a thud on the shore below where they were working. The last work Mitchell was seen employed at was screwing up a nut on a bolt. He was using both hands and it is thought that the heavy wrench slipped causing him to lose his balance. Mitchell as yet gives no explanation of the accident. When he struck the ground he got up and walked about ten or twelve feet from where he landed but was compelled to lie down. Mitchell was considered somewhat reckless in dangerous places. This was the third serious fall and narrow escape from instant death. On a previous occasion he fell from a bridge on which he was working in New Brunswick a distance of 60 feet. He at another time received a serious throw from a horse but this latter is more serious than all and the worst is looked for.

## SURE DEATH TO INSECTS.

(By Amos Gray, M. D.)

Amongst the pests and annoyances in the household, the little insect called the cockroach is almost the most active and energetic fellow. It is almost impossible to get rid of him, unless the most vigorous measures are taken and persisted in. They multiply rapidly and seem to come in droves when they make their appearance. In warmer countries they grow to a much larger size than they do in the United States and gigantic specimens can be found on some of our trading vessels of sufficient size to start a menagerie or freak show. ## ACCIDENT ON I. C. E.

Engines Damaged and Cars Injured

## Situation at Samoa.

BERLIN, July 28.—National Zeitung publishes an article containing information as to the proceedings of the commission appointed to consider and decide upon the Samoan question in which he says: "Then English authorities wanted to establish a force of 800 men under English command to maintain order. The commission was unable to agree to the proposition, but consented to establish a peace force of 100 men, drawn equally from the two native parties under command of two officers, not concerned in the recent events. In accordance with this agreement an English and a German lieutenant will each have charge of 50 men, under the superintendence of an American captain."

## THE RECENT BYE ELECTION.

DEAR SIR,—The election here on the 25th just passed off quietly and the result was a great surprise to the Liberals. Every possible effort was put forth by them to secure the return of their candidate. During the contest the Leader of the Government, the Attorney-General Commissioner of Public Works, Hon. James Richards, Mr. Bernard D. McLellan M. P. and others were present in the District endeavoring to induce by promises and bribes of all kinds the electors to support Mr. Gallant. But all their devices failed and they returned home sadder but wiser men.

Mr. Pineau, the Conservative candidate, although only placed in the field ten days before the election, worked unceasingly and must feel now that he is elected that his labor was not lost. He was ably assisted by Mr. Hackett and Mr. Birch M. L. A. both of whom did excellent work at the public meetings. The Conservatives were fairly well organized and much credit is due Mr. J. Albert Brennan, Convener for the District who by his untiring energy since the conference in Charlottetown has brought the organization to a high state of efficiency in this District. The Conservatives of the Province and district should feel proud of the victory.

They had to contend with the patronage and influence of both Local and Dominion Governments. The supervisors of roads, overseers, presiding officers and other beelers left nothing undone to prevent Conservative electors from voting and their chagrin must now be great when they find that with all their schemes and plots the Conservative candidate is elected. The result should encourage the intelligent men who have fought against such heavy odds to continue in the good work as in a very short time we shall see the last of the present corrupt combination.

The present fiction number August is remarkable for its color printing, its brilliant pictures by young artists, and the high excellence of the short stories. By an ingenious use of half-tone plates and hand engraving the color pictures are reproduced with striking truth to the originals.
