

East-West Set Up Training Camps For All-Star Game

TORONTO (CP)—The football scene shifted Monday from Vancouver and the riotous whirl of the Grey Cup game to Toronto and Hamilton where the East and West all-star teams have set up camps to prepare for Canada's first all-star game.

The tilt will be played here next Saturday at Varsity Stadium, following East and West rivalry in a new-up at the Grey Cup classic. The teams were picked by fans in a cross-country poll and at least 24 players will take part in the All-Star clash.

The total number depends on Frank (Pop) Ivy of Edmonton Eskimos, coach of the western all-stars. Both team's coaches were originally slated to pick three additional players each on top of the fans' choices to round out their squads.

Ivy's quota, however, has been raised to four because halfback

Doug (Peahead) Walker of Montreal Alouettes, who will direct the eastern team, has already named his three other players and they include defensive end Jim Miller of the Als. The fans picked 13 Montreal players for both the East's offensive and defensive line-ups and the addition of Miller places 14 Alouettes on the team.

Bowling Is A Popular And Ancient Pastime

One of the oldest and one of the most popular sports on the North American continent today is bowling. Being at once a pastime and a sport, bowling has grown with leaps and bounds until it ranks second to none as a participation sport. No doubt one of the reasons for its great popularity is the fact that anyone can play at it. Not that anyone can bowl well but everyone can at least make an attempt at it. Age makes little or no difference and neither bulging muscles nor in extraordinarily fine physical condition is needed. Only skill counts.

Estimated to be nearly 7000 years old, bowling, since it was first devised by the Egyptians in 5200 B.C., has had an eventful past. It has been used as a criterion for determining the spiritual state of early Christians; it has been outlawed by English kings as "dishonorable, useless and unprofitable"; and yet another English monarch recognized it as a great morale booster for his troops.

Henry the 3rd, Edward the 3rd, Richard the 2nd and Edward the 4th all at one time or another passed laws outlawing the sport. Their great fear seemed to be that so many of their vassals and fighting men were spending so much time at it that they were forsaking their target practice and weakening the powerful English armies that had won the respect of the world for their fighting powers.

Willard Chandler who bowls in the league is the only Charlotte-town player to have racked up a perfect game in the last few years. Willard made the magic 450 back in 1951. A few other bowlers have come close. Notably Don MacDonald who got 11 straight strikes in a game a couple of years ago and on the last ball left the 4-pins standing for a score of 446. George Kays, another city leaguer who last year's league with an average in excess of 255, racked up three 400 plus during an afternoon's play last fall.

With bowlers like this around we wouldn't be at all surprised if the present world's record was not only approached but broken before the spring arrives.

Dutch settlers in North America brought their nine-pin game to this continent. The sport was an immediate success but with the passing of the years it got into the hands of some unsavory gamblers and the game known as 9-pins was once again outlawed. However some lad who was one step ahead of the law added another pin to get around the law and by 1840 almost every block on Broadway boasted an alley.

Today there are various forms of the original 9-pin game played in Canada and the U.S. Candler pins, 5-pins, 10-pins and duck pins have their many enthusiastic and each enjoys its own personal popularity. 5-pins is a strictly Canadian game. It was originated by Tom Ryan, a Toronto sportsman, in 1910. Duck-pins were devised by a Pittsburgh bowler and candle-pin by another American, John Monsey of New England.

In Charlottetown bowling has **Shermie White** **Tops Scorers**

MONCTON (CP)—Shermie White of Amherst Ramblers added seven points to his scoring list last week, boosting his total to 37. Statistics released Monday night by league secretary-treasurer Bob Chandler show the smooth-working pivotman has 11 goals and 26 assists—tops in the four-team circuit.

Trailing White by four points is Hughie Campbell, playing coach of Fredericton Capitals. Campbell has a 10-23 mark for 33 points.

Pierre Brillant, Amherst sharp-shooter, out most of last week with an injury, slipped down to third spot but still tops the league in scoring with 18 goals. Brillant, who held the scoring lead in the first three weeks of play before White took over, has 30 points.

Jim Shirley, sidelined last week, continues to lead the goal-tender's list in all departments. His goals-against average is 2.27 and he has five shutouts.

Defenceman George White retained his badman label. He spent 34 minutes in the penalty box.

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four extra players Ivy will select will include another quarterback to spell Edmonton's Jackie Parker, the star of the Eskimos' 34-19 victory over Montreal in the Grey Cup game. Quarterbacks Buddy Leake of Winnipeg and Don Getty of Edmonton were mentioned as the two pivots Ivy likely will choose between, with Getty a slight favorite since the Eskimos' split-attack probably will be used as the West's basic offensive formation.

Walker, in picking his three extra players, bolstered the East's offensive and defensive power. Tom Dublinski of Argonauts, the leading passer in the Big Four this season, was selected as relief for Sam Etcheverry of the Alouettes and additional offensive strength was added in the selection of halfback Lou Kusserow of Hamilton. A capacity crowd of 27,000 paying a \$10-top for seats is expected to see the All-Stars in action. The game is slated to become an annual event, alternating between the East and West. It is sponsored by the Toronto Star Weekly and proceeds are to be divided between Canadian Shriners' Hospitals for Crippled Children in Montreal and Winnipeg.

Towne Gets Decision On Yvon Durelle's Foul Blow

NOTTINGHAM, England (AP)—Archie Towne of New York Monday night won a decision over Yvon Durelle of Baie Ste. Anne, N. B., in a Canadian light heavyweight championship fight. Durelle was disqualified in the seventh round of the scheduled 10-round fight here.

Durelle landed a punch in the region of Towne's neck in the seventh round. Referee Henderson, who appeared as restless as the crowd, sent Durelle to his corner and disqualified him just as the bell sounded to end the round.

Durelle was disqualified by Referee Eugene Henderson on charges of using a "rabbit punch." The ruling brought boos and hoots from the crowd while the Canadian stalked around the ring protesting his innocence. Durelle weighed 173, Towne 168.

Durelle often swung wildly but the mid-American managed for the most part to dodge his attacks. Towne was warned for punching low in the third round and again in the fourth.

The crowd began to get restless as early as the fifth round. Someone created excitement by tossing a coin into the ring while the fighters wrestled.
