## ADMINISTRATION OF THE YUKON

### Is the Cause of a Lively Debate.

IN WHICH SIR CHARLES, AND OTHERS TOOK PART.

Sir Charles Tupper Stirs up the Liberal Ministers—Foster Speaks.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, April 15.—In the House of Commons Sutherland, the Liberal whip, expressed confidence in the Yukon administration and in Commissioner Ogilvie.

Sir Charles Tupper considered the matter so grave that he could not give a silent vote.

He deprecated the attacks on private character and regretted that the necessity existed for mentioning in this House the personal behavior of Commissioner Walsh. But when a prominent London investor who came to this country with a letter from Lord Strathcona to Walsh, afterwards waited upon Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper to tell him that he had found Walsh drunk and could do nothing with him, it was necessary to deal with the case.

Sir Charles did not say these charges were true; but held that in the interests of the country, and of Walsh himself if he is innocent, it should be ascertained whether they are true or not.

They were the worst enemies of honest Yukon officials who refused them the opportunity to vindicate themselves.

Mr. Sifton went too far when he refused to allow any investigation except by a judge of his own appointment and a packed jury.

A judicial tribunal would either vindicate the Yukon administration, which would be a good thing, or else it might convict officials and drive the Minister of Interior out of public life, which would be a good thing for the country.

Sir Louis Davies replied with great vehemence, asserting that the opposition had failed to bring forward a single defamatory and specific charge, or any evidence supported by the name of a witness.

Mr. Foster charged that the Government had wasted a million dollars by sending soldiers to Yukon who were not needed, and that development had been kept back by excessive royalties, that nothing had been done to improve the sanitary conditions to provide trails and transportation routes.

The government had skinned the country, not for the benefit of the Ministers but to keep up a useless and costly military force in the country.

Mr. Foster showed that under the late Government a full investigation was ordered into many cases of civil service irregularities on the vaguest possible charges, yet this government demands specific allegations in regard to irregularities occurring thousands of miles away, and refuses enquiry without it.

## RETALIATING ON CANADA.

To Double the Duty on Canadian Lumber.

DETROIT, April 15.—The Washington special to the Detroit Free Press says: Hon. Mr. Dickinson has practically prevailed on the United States authorities at Washington to put in operation a retaliatory clause of the Dingley Bill as far as concerns Canadian lumber.

This would double the present rate of duty practically shutting out Canadian lumber from the United States.

## APPLE GROWING.

Work for This Month and the Next.

SIR.—It was to the individual foresight and exertion of the scattered farmers who planted trees many years ago and cultivated and cared for them in the interval that we should give the credit for the splendid samples of a dozen varieties of apples which were shipped by the direct ocean steamships Winnipeg and Gaspe to Great Britain last fall. The Fruit Growers' Association has a clear course under the guidance of its former Vice President for a progressive new era-making year. Let us begin now by preparing for top grafting. Each district should encourage one of its bright nimble-fingered residents, sons or fathers, to study up the simple art of top grafting and compounding the wax and reward him by giving him ample pay for top grafting all their inferior trees with better scions. A small sum for top grafting with valuable sorts will be a big investment for the tree owner; and give the man who does the grafting better pay than most lawyers and doctors get.

## Wireless Telegraphy.

LONDON, April 15.—The formation of a commercial syndicate is mooted here with the object of acquiring the sole right to establish ether communication between Great Britain and the United States under the system of Signor Marconi. The scheme is yet in nebulous form. The French Government has commissioned Signor Marconi to install his apparatus experimentally on a cruiser. If the experiment proves a success several French warships will be provided with the apparatus.

## STRIKE ON THE BULLION.

Recent diamond drill tests on the Bullion location, which adjoins the Mikado mine, reveal a body of ore 30 feet wide at a depth of 161 feet. The quartz core taken from the vein was 37 feet long, but as the drill was boring at an angle, allowance is accordingly made, and the above width figured out. The vein in which the boring was done is the one that the Mikado people struck the enormously rich pocket in some time ago, and is expected the ore found by the Bullion Company contains large quantities of free gold. A working shaft is now being sunk on the spot where the diamond drill indicated the big ore body.—Rat Portage News.

The Bullion Mining Co. have struck the celebrated Mikado No. 2 vein on their property at a depth of 160 feet. The vein is 30 feet wide.

The Bullion is a development company with a capital of about \$300,000, and the \$1 shares which have been selling at 70c. cannot now be had.—Insurance and Finance Chronicle, April 7, 1899.

The Mikado No. 2 vein above mentioned, was referred to in an editorial in THE EXAMINER of December 10, 1898, and the ore was stated to run \$10,000 to the ton. The quartz was so studded with the yellow metal that when it was cracked it held together by the ligaments of pure gold. The Montreal London Gold and Silver company, in which several Charlottetown people are interested, holds a large number of shares in the Bullion mine, and if the above extracts are reliable it will be a splendid investment for the Montreal-London.

## Russians and Finns.

HULL, England, April 13.—There is a great rush of young Finlanders for the United States, to avoid the recent decree of Emperor Nicholas regarding Finland, which provides for an increase of the Russian military and naval forces and the extension of conscription.

LONDON, April 13.—The Westminster Gazette says that Russia and England have agreed upon their respective spheres of influence in China upon a basis similar to the terms of the Anglo-French in Africa.
