NEW YORK (AP)—Don McKenzie, playing his first game for New York, after being traded by Boston Bruins, broke a 3-2 tie midway in the second period and assisted on the fifth goal as the Rangers turned back Montreal Canadiens 6-3 in a wild National Hockey League game Wednesday night.

Trailing 3-1, the Rangers put on a tremendous comeback in the second period scoring three goals to go ahead 4-3 at the end of the period. Goalie Gump Worsley of New York was hurt in a goal-mouth collision on the Canadiens' disputed third goal midway in the first period. It took seven stitches to close a laceration on his scalp, but he came back to hold Montreal scoreless the rest of the way.

The injury to Worsley seemed to inspire the New Yorkers in the second period. Dave Balon's rebound shot and defenceman Harry Howell's unassisted goal pulled New York into a 3-3 tie. McKenzie's deflection of Andy Bathgate's shot made it 4-3 and the veteran center then set up Bathgate's 24th goal early in the third period.
