Postmaster At
Alberton Retires
After 22 Years

After twenty-two years as
postmaster at Alberton, Mr. H.
Waldo Matthews retired yesterday.
A veteran of World War I, Mr.
Matthews assumed his duties as
postmaster on October 7, 1931 and
since that time has served the
public with outstanding efficiency
and with a genial courtesy that
has made him popular with ev-
eryone.
When interviewed yesterday Mr.
Matthews said that he had found
that if one treated the public well
he would be well treated by them.
During his years as postmaster
there has been only commendation
for the service given by Mr.
Matthews and his staff, and all
his relationships have been cor-
dial. Only on rare occasions has
he been troubled by such things
as customers coming in late. Of
the clerks, couriers and janitors
who have worked with him, Mr.
Matthews speaks in terms of
warm appreciation, making special
mention of their absolute depend-
ability.
The clerks who have served
with Mr. Matthews during his
term of office are Mrs. Matthews,
Miss Edith Dunn (now Mrs. John
Gordon), Miss Eleanor Gaudet
(now Mrs. Roger Camire), Miss
Mabel Fielding and Mr. Heath
Profit.
The new postmaster is Mr.
Heath Profit, a veteran of World
War II. Working with him are
Mrs. H. W. Matthews and Mr.
Byron Weeks.

TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 8th
The following courses will be offered:
Grade XI (Academic): Mathematics, English, French, Latin or
German, Science, History.
These six subjects are compulsory for students desiring to enter
university or the Nursing profession. To obtain complete matricu-
lation these subjects must be taken during an additional year in Grade
XII. Henceforth, this will constitute Junior Matriculation.
Grade XI (General): English, Science, History, from the Ac-
ademic class, and any four other subjects from this possible list: Busi-
ness Arithmetic, Typing, Shorthand, Bookkeeping, Domestic Science
Music, Farm Mechanics, Navigation, Drafting, or any electives from
the Academic course.
Students may obtain a Grade XI School Leaving Certificate on
completion of the above course.
Grade XII (Academic): Grade XII for this year will be the same
as in former years. A pass in any subject constitutes a first year uni-
versity credit.
Grade XI (Commercial): This will continue to be a two-year
Secretarial course, except for those in the General course noted
above.
To enter Grade XI (Academic, General, or Commercial): A stu-
dent must have passed the Entrance Examination.
