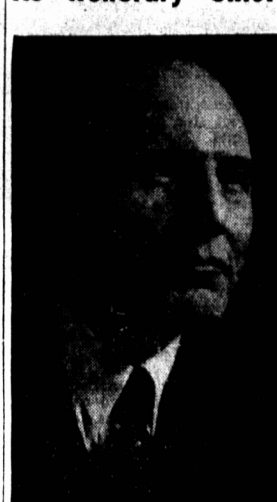

Investiture Of Bank President As Honorary Chief



Lethbridge, Alberta, July 28. James Muir, (above) President of the Royal Bank of Canada, a director of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and a director of The Scotman Publications Limited, was yesterday invested as a member of the exclusive Honorary Chieftainship of the Blood Indian tribe. His Indian name, Eagle Ribbs, was bestowed upon him in a colourful ceremony by Head Chief Shot-on-Both-Sides. His Excellency, Viscount Alexander, is Chief Eagle Head in the same tribe. Among others on the roster, limited to 35 men, are the Earl of Bessborough, Rt. Hon. Vincent Massey, Governor General of Canada, representative provincial premiers, leading churchmen, and a few of the most prominent business men in Canada.

This latest tribute is the third signal honour to be given Mr. Muir in three years: in October 1952 he received the Freedom of his home town, Peebles, and in June 1953 he was invested honours causa with the D.C.L. degree by Bishop's University. To honour Mr. Muir, the Indians came, 2,000 strong, to the sacred ground of the Sun Dance camp on a flat expanse amid sand hills where tradition places the "Happy Hunting Grounds". Here the spirits of departed tribesmen pursue an endless career, and here their living descendants come once a year to carry out the sacred rites of the Sun Dance.

Surrounding the Medicine Lodge was a great ring of tepees, each embellished with paintings of charging buffaloes, flying eagles, mystic thunder birds and sinuous serpents, each tepee with its entrance facing the rising sun. Within the circle there wheeled and charged painted and feather-bedecked braves and warriors, their ponies cavorting to the throb of tomtoms.

Presented for initiation by the Venerable Dr. S. H. Middleton, Mr. Muir squatted cross-legged on the magnificent buffalo robe that has been used for many such ceremonies. On it stood His Majesty King George VI when he visited the Bloods in 1939, and three years ago Viscount Alexander sat there to receive the war-bonnet. The Head Chief and ten minor chiefs, assisted by medicine men, enacted a colourful ceremony. One, naked save for paint, breech-cloth and moccasins, solemnly marked Mr. Muir's cheeks with double stripes of sacred paint. Then he placed a magnificent eagle-feather war-bonnet, first on his own head, then on Mr. Muir's, thus signifying his acceptance into the Blood tribe.

HORSE POPULATION EBBS

OTTAWA (CP)—The popularity of the farm horse is at its lowest ebb in more than 60 years. For the first time since the 1880, their numbers have fallen below 1,000,000. The bureau of statistics, reporting Wednesday on a June 1 livestock survey, estimated there were 993,300 horses on farms, a drop of nine per cent from the 1,096,200 at June 1 last year.

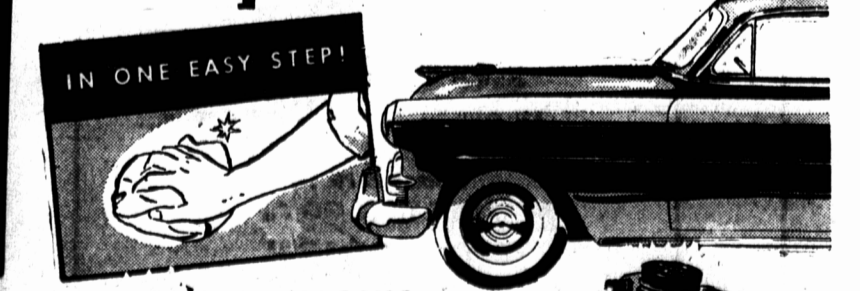
