VALUE FROM \$50 TO \$100

Fifty-Two Scholarships Awarded To College Girls

Fifty-two scholarships, ranging in value from \$50 to \$100, have been awarded to St. Dunstan's University girls by the Catholic Girls' Scholarship Association.

The announcement was made last night by Mrs. B. W. DesRoches, Miscouche, three-time president of the CGSA, who presented the scholarships at SDU yesterday afternoon.

In her remarks, Mrs. DesRoches stated that the CGSA was formed in 1947 by members of the Catholic Women's League, but since the CWL is not primarily a fund-raising organization, it was decided to form a separate association to administer the scholarships.

She said the aim of the organization is to assist in providing scholarships at St. Dunstan's University for Roman Catholic girls of the diocese of Charlottetown. Interested persons may become members of the association by contributing amounts ranging from \$20 to \$50.

The academic adviser to the CGSA, Rev. O. C. Sharkey of SDU, pointed out that there had been a gradual increase in recent years in the number of girls attending St. Dunstan's, from 50

A.R. Henderson Dies In Hospital

Arthur Russell Henderson, 74, a resident of Winsloe and formerly of Union Road, died early Friday morning at the Prince Edward Island Hospital after a short illness.

Before joining the army he was employed with the railway as a telegrapher.

A veteran of both wars, Mr. Henderson went overseas in the First World War with the First Light Horse Battalion and later served in France with the Canadian Mounted Rifles.

After returning to the Island he farmed at the old homestead on Union Road.

He went overseas in the Second World War with reinforcements and was attached to the tank corps in England. At this time he was 42 years of age. After the war he retired.

Surviving are two brothers, Fred and Guy of Charlottetown; two daughters, Mrs. Joyce Argent, Charlottetown; Mrs. Lloyd Diamond, Winsloe.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Diamond of Union Road, predeceased him. His father was station agent at York.

Another brother, Cecil, who also predeceased him, was the first Islander killed with the Princess Pats Light Infantry. He was 19 years of age when he served in World War One.

Married twice, both wives predeceased him. They were Rosa Mary Doyle of Rustico and Nellie Nicholson of Charlottetown.

The funeral will take place Sunday at 1:30 p.m. from the Cutcliffe Funeral Home to Floral Hills Cemetery.

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Bogus Bills Passed In Saint John

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP) — City Police said they were holding a man and looking for another man in connection with the passing of counterfeit \$20 bills in this area Friday night.

Police said two of the bills were passed in Saint John stores and two others in nearby Lancaster. All bore the serial number 808850 and police said the eight were inverted.

Meanwhile three bogus \$20 bills were discovered Friday in Woodstock, N.B., and more than 10 of the bills turned up in Fredericton earlier in the week. Police in Woodstock said the serial number on the bills passed there matched the number given by Saint John Police.

RCMP in Fredericton said bills recovered there were "near perfect" copies bearing the number 8249072.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says it was clear in all parts of the Maritimes except northern New Brunswick Friday evening. Temperatures were in the chilly twenties. An area of high pressure, centred over the ocean south of Yarmouth, is moving east away from our district. Meanwhile a fast moving storm, now over James Bay, is expected to sweep across Quebec today reaching Labrador in the evening. Strong southwesterly winds, associated with this system, will bring much milder air into all regions. Scattered showers are predicted late in the day in all three provinces, at the leading edge of colder air circling in behind this storm. These showers will change to snow-furries in northern New Brunswick late in the day. On Sunday most of the district should be cloudy and cold.

Regional forecasts:

Prince Edward Island, Eastern New Brunswick Counties, Lower Saint John River Valley: Cloudy with a few sunny periods, and much milder. Scattered showers in the afternoon and evening. Winds light, increasing before dawn to southerly 25 with gusts to 45, and shifting in the evening to westerly 15. Low-high at Charlottetown 23 and 45, Moncton and Fredericton 19 and 45, Saint John 20 and 45. Outlook for Sunday: Cloudy and cold.
