Household Hints.

To Bone a Ham.—Soak the ham all night in tepid water. In the morning put it into the ham boiler, after cleaning and scraping it free from mold, add warm water, not hot, set over the fire and bring slowly to the boiling point, keep it gently simmering, not boiling hard, till perfectly tender, then lay it on a platter or wooden tray till cool, when all the bones must be carefully removed. Cut it clear round the hock, and loosen the bone from the thick part with a thin, sharp boning knife and pull out all the bones with great care. Then press the meat into shape, tie it in a clean cloth and return to the boiling liquor. Take the pot from the fire and leave the ham in the liquor till thoroughly cold, and then when ready for use cut it across like beef's tongue.

A "young friend" inquires if fish for boiling should be put into hot or cold water, and how one can tell when it is cooked enough.—All fresh fish or meat should be put into boiling water; salt fish or meat into cold water. Before putting the fish into the boiling water, throw in two tablespoonfuls of salt, if a large fish, and three tablespoonfuls of vinegar. This will secure the best flavor of the fish, and the vinegar will not affect the taste at all. The water must be boiling when the fish is laid in, but after that it must only simmer. Never boil fish. If a whole fish, it is done when it begins to crack, or cleave apart from under the gills. If only a part of a fish, it will spring off a little from the backbone. Do not let it cook a minute longer after that.

It is asked if there is any way, other than boiling, to cook a beef's tongue?—Yes, several: one of the best is to half-boil a fresh tongue. While boiling, make ready a pint of beef broth, or rich stock; chop a little parsley, one small onion, one small carrot; salt, pepper to taste; half a can of tomatoes, or an equal quantity of fresh tomatoes, and add two tablespoonfuls of butter. Put the tongue in this sauce and let it stew slowly till quite tender. When done enough to peel, take it up, remove the skin, return to the same sauce for half an hour, then lay it on a platter. Wet two tablespoonfuls of flour to a smooth paste and stir into the broth until it thickens. Beat up two eggs, if plenty, and stir in the last thing; then pour this sauce over the tongue and serve.

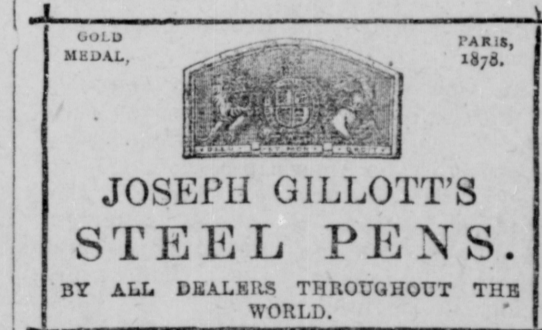
