

Alberton Man Nominated By Prince Conservatives

Dr. O.H. Phillips, Alberton was nominated as Progressive Conservative candidate for Prince County in the next Federal election at a largely attended nominating convention held last evening in Summerside's Civic Auditorium at which Mr. Donald Fleming, M.P., Q.C. of Toronto-Engleton was guest speaker.

Dr. Phillips, a young Alberton dentist was the only nominee. His nomination was moved by Dr. L.G. Dewar of O'Leary, seconded by Henry W. Wedge, Summerside. Dr. Phillips is a veteran, having served with the R.C.A.F. during the Second World War.

MR. FLEMING
"It is a happy experience to come into the Atlantic region and find evidence of vigorous growth and strong vitality in the Conservative Party," said Mr. Fleming. Mr. Fleming spoke of the striking victory of the P.C.'s in Nova Scotia last week and said that it was very significant that Robert Stanfield, the N.S. Conservative leader stated in his post-election statement that Federal issues entered largely in the decision of Nova Scotia voters. He said that the election in Nova Scotia has communicated rising hopes to P.C.'s on P.E.I. and in other provinces and stated that among the issues at stake in the next Federal election is the "restoration of the integrity of the Canadian Parliament."

He referred to the powers conferred on Trade Minister C.D.

that the Conservative Party officially brought before the House of Commons, their national development policy, which he said, is for parts of Canada." Mr. Fleming said the P.C. Party is determined to inaugurate policies in the Federal field that will benefit the Provinces, as he said that presently the provincial and municipal governments are being starved for revenue and the government is refusing to recognize its responsibilities. "The tide is running in favor of our party," he said, "but it is being dictated by the needs of the people."

The guest speaker concluded "ours is a party of progress because ours is a dynamic Conservatism."

Dr. Hubert MacNeill, newly elected president of the East Prince P.C. Association chaired the meeting and referred to Mr. Fleming as a great statesman, a great Conservative and a great Canadian.

The speaker was introduced by Mr. MacQuell. During the meeting a telegram from the Prince, former Federal candidate for Prince was read in which he expressed regret at being unable to attend.

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Let's Talk It Over

In the even tenor of normal living conditions an observer of community life might get the idea that the creature sometimes called "Homo Sapiens" is a more or less selfish individual. He is very busy looking out for number one, this highly competitive business of making a living, and may the devil in the well-known shape of the wolf on the doorstep, take the hindmost. It is only when calamities such as the Springhill mine disaster strikes that we realize what a great flood of human sympathy is stored up ready for release to help the sufferers in such a catastrophe.

First of all, in the rescue operations, men risked and sometimes gave their lives to get men whom they had never seen out of the gas-filled pit. Many localities of the Maritimes are helping in the necessary work of relief. Locally, the Legion branches of Prince County, led by the Summerside branch with its splendid contribution, are hastening to the aid of the unfortunate residents of the hard-hit Mining town. Borden, O'Leary and Tignish Legions have already voted money for relief.

The Summerside firemen have contributed and the churches are beginning to organize committees for this work of mercy. "Mans' inhumanity to Man" as the poet Burns put it, must be reckoned with, as is evidence today in the atrocities in Hungary. But it is comforting to know as we face the crisis of possible war, that "Man's sympathy for man" is also a potent factor in the pattern of our lives.

Alberton Trade Bd. Elects Officers, Hears Tariff Talk

Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, Parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Fisheries, was guest speaker at the annual meeting of the Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade, held in Alberton public library last night.

President J. Frank Bryan presided and in his annual report reviewed the work of the board since its re-organization about a year ago, which included support for a variety of projects for the benefit of the people of Prince County in general and West Prince in particular such as veterinary services, motor vehicle licensing bureau, freight train services, tour-

ists promotion and improved harbour facilities. In an informative address Mr. MacNaught dealt with the history of potato tariffs between Canada and the United States over the past twenty-five years. The chief difficulty, as he saw it, with the present favorable U.S. set up was the impact on the Canadian domestic market in those years when the United States have a surplus such as this year when they are fifty million bushels over their average crop. He assured the board that the tariff problem was receiving continuous consideration at Ottawa.

A second West Prince Board of Trade project was also dealt with by the speaker, the improvement of the Alberton Harbour. Mr. MacNaught assured the board that the survey was in the estimates and would definitely be carried out. Following his address approval of the Alberton Board was given to a resolution dealing with the potato tariff situation, drawn up at a meeting Tuesday evening of the Summerside Board of Trade and attended by representatives from Alberton Board.

S'ide Board Of Trade Will Consider Tariff Deal Tonight

President John S. Wright has called a special meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade for this evening to give consideration to a resolution drawn up on Tuesday night regarding the present tariff on potatoes shipped from Canada to the United States. The present tariff permits the import of American potatoes to Canada duty free except for a six-week period during the summer. Canadian potatoes shipped to the United States are subject to a 37 1/2 percent duty per hundredweight until the allowable quota is reached at which time the duty is doubled.

At the regular monthly meeting of the board held on Thursday night, November 1st, it was decided to call a meeting of the various Island boards at which a resolution would be drafted asking the Federal Government to try for more favorable arrangements with the United States. On Tuesday night the representatives of four boards of trade met in Summerside and the resolution was drawn up for submission to the members of those boards.

Present also was Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., the representative of West Prince Board, the Charlottetown Board and the Crapaud Board, Mr. Archie Johnston, president of the "ederation of Agriculture and Mr. Elric Campbell, manager of the Mar-

keting Board. Tonight the Summerside Board in special meeting will deal with the resolution and when all the other boards have met and discussed the matter it will be forwarded to Ottawa. It is understood that consideration will be given to the matter of having a representative delegation go to Ottawa to present the resolution.
