MONDAY, Oct. 13.—The translation of King Edward, the confessor (1042-1066) son of Ethelred and Emma, is ecclesiastically remembered on the 13th of Oct.; but his death occurred on 5th Jan., 1066. The translation of Enoch to heaven at the age of 335 years, occurred 3017, B. C. The prophet Elijah was translated to heaven in a chariot of fire, 896, B. C. The possibility of translation to the abode of Eternal Life, has been maintained by some extravagant enthusiasts, but in 1703, the Irish House of Commons expelled Mr. Asgill from his seat, for the book he wrote, asserting the possibility of transition to the other world, without death.

SIR HUGH CHILDERS, Chancellor of the Exchequer, it is reported, held a conference a few days ago with a Gladstone upon the question of prolonging the period for conversion of consols, which expires on the 17th inst. It was decided not to prolong, the conversion scheme being a failure, as bankers and insurance companies refuse thus to convert their funds. Only a number of small investors have exchanged their per cent. for two and a half per cents.

Disastrous and Fatal Collision.

GLASGOW, Oct. 11. A despatch just received from Greenock states that the steamers Rasorville and Europa collided off the latter port, and that the Europa sank almost immediately after the collision, and that the captain, engineer and four men of the latter vessel were drowned.

Independence of Holland.

PARIS, Oct. 12. The Memorial Diplomatique says Earl Granville, the British foreign secretary, is negotiating a treaty with the Dutch Government, pledging England to maintain the independence of Holland.

Explosion in Quebec.

QUEBEC, Oct. 12. The Parliament buildings were so badly injured in the explosion yesterday that it is thought fully half the buildings will have to be taken down and rebuilt. The origin of the fire is yet a mystery.

Opposition Tactics.

LONDON, Oct. 12. The consultation among the Conservative leaders has resulted in a decision to reject the re-distribution scheme and to maintain the opposition to the franchise bill, and try to force a dissolution of Parliament.

Diphtheria Epidemic.

ASTORIA, L. I., Oct. 12. Diphtheria has become epidemic in the fifth ward of Long Island City. There have been over fifty cases reported, and five deaths have occurred to-day.

Whiskey Destroyed.

UNIONTOWN, KY., Oct. 12. The bonded warehouse of J. B. Roach & Co. was totally destroyed by fire yesterday, with two hundred barrels of old whiskey. The total loss is \$175,000.

Drowned.

HALIFAX, Oct. 12. Yesterday afternoon four persons were drowned by the upsetting of a boat off George's Island.

HALIFAX, Oct. 12. The Governor General and Lady Lansdowne arrived here on Saturday morning.

CAIRO, Oct. 12. The murder of Col. Stewart and party is confirmed.

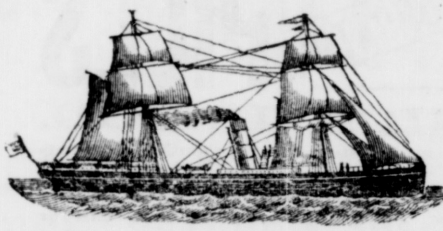

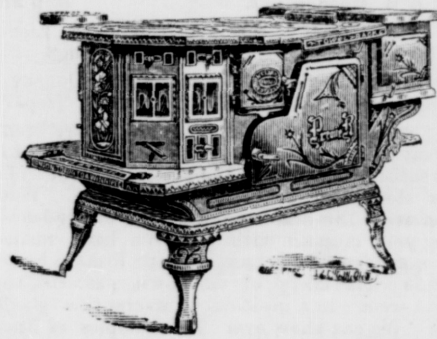
