## GENERAL HUTTON GIVES WAY And Major Talbot is Reinstated.

### VERY NEARLY A RUPTURE OF THE RELATIONS

Between the Minister of Militia and  
General Hutton

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER]

OTTAWA, Nov. 21.—An unpleasant incident, which threatened the rupture of harmonious relations between the Minister of Militia and the new commander of the forces, has been brought to a satisfactory and mutually honorable conclusion.

Early in October, Major Talbot, the Quartermaster and Paymaster of the Yukon contingent, arrived in Ottawa on leave of absence obtained from Lieut.-Col. Evans, his superior officer.

When he called to pay his respects to Major-General Hutton, he was informed that his services would be no longer required and that his office was abolished.

Talbot appealed to the Minister with the result that General Hutton was asked not to insist upon the action he had taken.

General Hutton would not agree to cancel the order until almost the last resources of persuasion had been exhausted and the situation took on a critical aspect.

Finally he yielded and Talbot will leave for the Yukon on Saturday to resume his duties.

### Explosion in Paris.

PARIS, Nov. 21.—A terrific explosion occurred yesterday in the Cafe du Champ-eaux.

A woman was killed outright and eight other persons seriously injured.

It is thought that the explosion was due to ignited gas, but there are rumors of an anarchist plot.

### Royal Victoria College.

MONTREAL, November 19.—It is rumored Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal will very handsomely endow the Royal Victoria college, which the Canadian High Commissioner built in connection with McGill college. The new college has been completed for some months, but there being no fund for its support, the halls have remained silent. It is stated the endowment fund which will come from Lord Strathcona will be in the vicinity of a million dollars.

LONDON, Nov 21.—Sir George Knight Baden Powell, an eminent political economist and authority on colonial affairs, who has represented the Kirkcaldy division of Liverpool in parliament in the Conservative interests since 1885, died yesterday in the 61st year of his age.

### Cambridge Defeats Yale

NEW HAVEN, Nov. 21.—Cambridge defeated Yale at football, on Saturday, 15 to 0.

### Tramway in Liverpool

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 18.—A gigantic scheme is on foot to connect, by means of a tramway system, the towns of Liverpool, St. Helen, Leigh, Wigan, Bolton, and intermediate places. The scheme, which is arousing much interest in Lancashire, provides for the conveyance of passengers by day and goods by night. Electricity will be the motive power. Several of the districts affected have already approved of the scheme, and others are now considering it.

### Sultan and Kaiser.

LONDON, Nov. 18.—The Daily Mail says this morning: "An important result of Emperor William's tour is an agreement on the part of the Sultan to give his benevolent sanction to the Zionist movement. This agreement between the Ottoman ruler and the German Emperor is still more important as indicating the friendly intimacy of the two monarchs, and its probable influence upon general politics."

### Austrian Emperor's Jubilee.

VIENNA, Nov. 18.—An incident of the Emperor's jubilee will be a pastoral letter signed by the whole Austrian episcopate, which will be read in the pulpits of the empire on Sunday, November 27th. After reviewing the Emperor's fifty years' reign, the letter refers to his strong religious feeling, and concludes with an expression of hope that his jubilee may mark the day of the reconciliation of the Austrian peoples.

### Military Manœuvres in Japan.

YOKOHAMA, Nov 18.—Extensive military manœuvres are in progress near Kobe. The evolutions are being conducted in the presence of the Emperor and a number of foreign military attaches, upon whom the Emperor has conferred orders in honor of the occasion.

### Food for the Starving.

MOSCOW, Nov 18.—By order of the dowager mother of the Czar Nicholas, Gen Schwedoff, with twenty officers, has just come to convey relief provided by the Red Cross Society to the famine sufferers in Asiatic Russia.

### War Risks.

LIVERPOOL, November 19.—The war-like tendencies of the times have caused the formation of a Permanent War Risks Association in England. Sailing ship owners have been approached with a proposal that they should pay an annual premium of two cents per \$500, and in the event of hostilities a premium varying according to circumstances. It is proposed that the premium shall be capitalized, and quite up to meet the losses. It was decided that the association should not be registered until \$10,000,000 has been entered. So successful has the proposal been that already \$25,000,000 have been obtained. The great advantage of the scheme is that beyond the premium of two cents per \$500, no premium need be paid in case of war scares, and that even in the case of war no premium is to be required unless the vessel is captured.

### Springhill Coal.

SPRINGHILL, Nov 19.—The importance to the people of Springhill of the new seams of coal discovered by the Messrs. Fletcher and McCarthy is just beginning to be realized. If there was any doubt at all as to the permanency of the town there can be none now. The strange part of it is that where they are now making surface openings in two or three large seams, some miles away, Mr Levisy and other in their day spent large sums of money prospecting without success.

### Situation in Jamaica

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Nov 16.—Considerable disappointment has been occasioned by a despatch from Washington announcing the failure of the negotiations for the proposed Anglo-American reciprocity treaty for the West Indies. The Hon S C Burke, the leader of the "Popular" side in the Legislature, in an interview in regard to this matter, says: "The question now arises, if the West Indies cannot obtain American reciprocity, or countervailing duties in the home markets is the only alternative to ruin which is left us. But this is a deplorably insufficient one, and the question of Canadian annexation of Jamaica must, therefore, arise and be agitated as it never has heretofore, with the view of compelling further action."

### The Alien Law.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 18.—It looks as if Mr. De Barry, the United States officer who has made himself notorious in connection with the enforcement of the alien labour law, has exceeded his duties. A high authority informs your correspondent that when the International Commission met at Quebec an understanding was reached by the two parties that, pending a conclusion on this question, there should be no action taken by either country to enforce the law. Mr De Barry's recent action therefore came in the nature of a surprise to the Government. It is likely that the attention of the Treasury Department will be drawn to De Barry's conduct with a view to his being called down.

### A Hero Burned to Death.

ST. JOHN, Nov. 18.—Paul Kingston, aged 69, a hired man with George Fitzpatrick, was burned to death in his employer's house at 5 o'clock this morning. It happened on Black River road, about five miles from town. Fitzpatrick had recently bought the house and lived there with a grandchild and two very old ladies and Kingston. When he learned that the house was on fire he could not get out the door, but sprang from a window. One of the ladies escaped, as did the child. Fitzpatrick entered the house and carried out the other old lady. He could not find Kingston, who had left his room and entered another, where he was suffocated. The house was destroyed.
