## Local and Other Items.

THE FORESTERS.—The High Court of Foresters is in session today at Kensington. The session will be continued to-morrow. There is a good attendance of delegates.

WEATHER IN ENGLAND.—According to late despatches bright warm weather still prevails throughout England. The wells and springs are beginning to run dry and a serious state of things is expected unless it rains soon.

MEETING AT SOURIS.—At a meeting of the people of Souris held on Monday evening, it was decided that the fire wardens or their successors should issue debentures for \$2,000 for 15 years at 4 per cent, the money to be used for the erection of a tank and the purchase of a hand engine and four pumps for fire protection. A committee was appointed to carry the resolution into effect.

POLICE COURT.—Charles Slate and Henry Welsh, two old offenders, were this morning sentenced to three months imprisonment with hard labor for vagrancy. Norman Valley, charged with being drunk and incapable, was remanded until to-morrow to enable the prosecutor to produce evidence in support of a separate charge of being drunk, disorderly and fighting on the streets preferred against the prisoner.

A BRAVE WOMAN.—We regret to learn from the Guardian that yesterday afternoon during the absence of her maid and little daughter. Mrs. Harrison Carvell had the misfortune to fall, causing a backward dislocation of the elbow. Fortunately a telephone was in the room and the patient being quite alone, herself summoned a physician, who quickly restored the bones to their socket. Mrs. Carvell bravely bore the painful operation without an anaesthetic and is now doing nicely.

CHILD INJURED.—A Hanover, Ontario, despatch says: A little daughter of Mr. F. Wise, a farmer living near Allan Park, wandered off to the barnyard on Saturday and was attacked by a game rooster. When the child was found the rooster was standing over her and striking at her with his spurs. The poor little thing was covered with blood and so exhausted that it could not cry out. She was brought to Hanover and a physician found that the rooster had driven his spurs into her head in several places, one just above one of her eyes.

POSTAL INVESTIGATION.—Postmaster Brecken, who was at Souris prosecuting the enquiry into the matter of the missing Magdalena Islands mail bag, returned to the city yesterday afternoon. The mail bag, it will be remembered, was lost about a month ago. It was found on Saturday in a field at Souris, minus its contents with the exception of one newspaper. A careful examination was made of the spot where the bag was found and the conclusion arrived at was that it had not been there more than two or three days. Mr. Macdonald, Post Office Inspector for Nova Scotia, and Mr. LeSuer, Secretary of the Postal Department at Ottawa, accompanied Mr. Brecken.

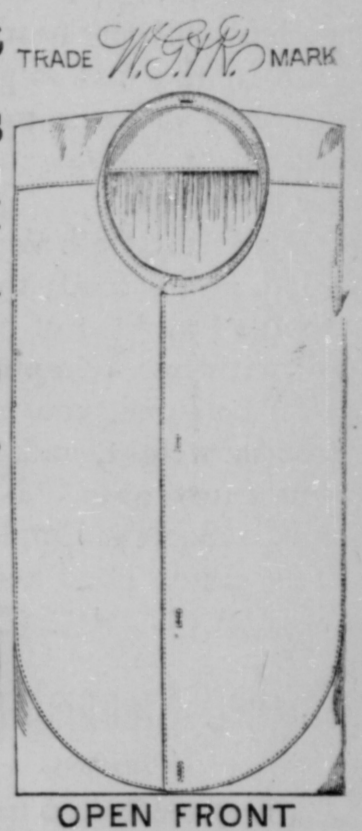

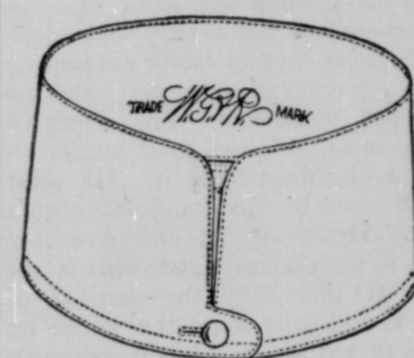
