**Ceylone in New Caledonia.**

**TERRIBLE DESTRUCTION OF LIFE AND PROPERTY.**

A despatch from Sydney, New South Wales, states that the Island of New Caledonia was visited by a fearful cyclone storm on the 24th Jan., which resulted in an enormous destruction of property and loss of life within the circle of the storm. The wind is estimated to have blown at the rate of one hundred miles an hour. At Numca, the seat of Government, the scene is described as having been terrible. The sea rose to an almost unprecedented height, the force of the wind was greater than had been experienced there for years, and the waves, notwithstanding the fact that the harbor is sheltered by several outlying Islands, swept the shore, and drove several ships which were lying at anchor in port, upon rocks, and wrecked them completely.

Houses were unroofed or blown down, in many cases crushing the inhabitants beneath the ruins. In the Loyalty and other adjacent Islands the effects of the cyclone were less pronounced, only because there was less to destroy. The course of the storm was southerly, and it is supposed to have crossed the whole width of the Pacific, from the direction of the northern coast of South America or Mexico, subsiding before reaching the shores of Australia.

Reports from the interior of New Caledonia speak of the great destruction of life and property in the agricultural villages at the mines and in the peninsula of Ducoco, the penal settlement of France, to which country the Island belongs. [New Caledonia is an island of the South Pacific Ocean, belonging to France, and lying about 720 miles east-north-east of the coast of Queensland, in Australia, in lat. 20° 22' 30" S., long. 164° 16' 7" E. It is about 200 miles in length, 30 miles in breadth, and has a population estimated at 60,000. It is of volcanic origin, is traversed in the direction of its length, from north-west to south east, by a range of mountains, which in some cases reach the height of about 8000 feet, and is surrounded by sand-banks and coral reefs.]

**Irish Relief Notes.**

A committee on Irish Relief has been formed at Paris, under the Presidency of the Archbishop of Paris.

The Times' Paris despatch says the Universe has forwarded 1,000 francs to the Catholic Archbishop of Cashel for the relief of the distress in his diocese.

Major Nolan's seed potato bill authorizes the poor law officers to borrow money without interest from the Commissioner of Public Works, for the purchase of seed potatoes, to sell to tenants solely for planting, at cost or under, on credit or not, with or without security as the authorities may think fit. The treasurer will be empowered to issue half a million from the constitutional fund if required for that purpose. The bill is to be operative the year after the passage, and thence forward till the end of the next session of Parliament.

**Reciprocity.**

There is some little interest being manifested in the United States in a renewal of the reciprocity in Canada, but it is not sufficiently widespread to warrant the belief in an early resumption of negotiations to that end. Mr. Charles Powers and Henry T. Woods, representatives of the Boston Board of Trade, have arrived at Washington to urge favorable action on the measure introduced by Representative Morse before the committee on foreign affairs, looking to the appointment of a commission to confer with a similar commission to be appointed by the British government with regard to a reciprocity treaty between the United States and Canada.

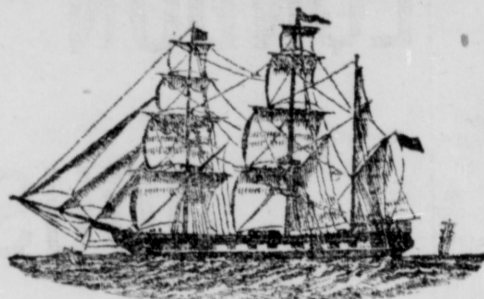

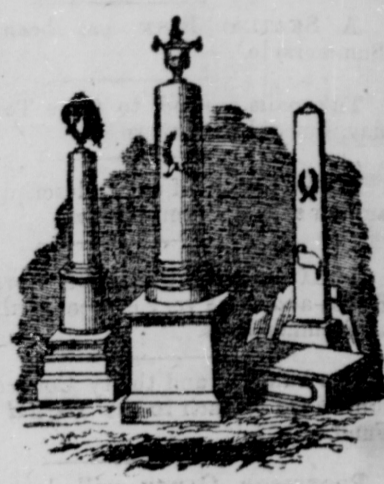
