FOR THE LAND OF GOLD.

Four Boats Built—The Gold Output—A Fish Story.

By Saturday evening's mail Councillor Nicholson received a very interesting letter from Mr. Alex. McRae, one of the party which left Charlottetown for the Klondike early in February last. The letter is dated at Lake Tagish, on the 28th May. After stating that the party are all well Mr. McRae goes on to say:—

"We finished our four boats yesterday and will be ready to leave here in three or four days. We expect to be able to go right along. Marsh Lake is breaking up fast and will be clear in a day or two. Once that breaks it will be clear to Lake Le Berge, and by the time we get there Lake Le-Berge will likely be open.

"Captain Strickland of the Mounted Police here, told us on Sunday that there were \$20,000, 00 in gold at Dawson ready to go out by the first steamers. The output, he said, would astonish the world. We are acquainted with a man whose brother has taken out one and a quarter millions, so we feel pretty good on it now

"The mosquitoes have arrived in full force. We were nearly eaten up by them yesterday. They are a small kind but they can bite. It was very warm yesterday, about 80 in the shade. One can read a paper at 10 30 p. m., and 2 30 a. m.

"The other day we caught four trout that would average nine pounds each. I saw one caught that weighed twenty-eight pounds. They make good eating, and we get some wild duck, so we fair pretty well."
