ARRIVAL OF THE ENGLISH MAIL.

The Lady Le Marchant brought the English Mail from Pictou on Friday last. By the papers which it furnished we have received the most ample details of the final storming and capture of Sebastopol. As nothing can be more interesting than these details, we devote a large portion of our present No. to their insertion.

There will be found amongst our extracts a short account of an engagement said to have taken place at Eupatoria between the Allies and the Russians, in which their usual good fortune followed the arms of the former. The intelligence of this event appears to have come through Russian channels, and, as might be expected, does not give a very favorable account of the Allies.

In our last paper, writing on the subject of steam communication, we made a statement to this effect—that provided the Commissioners appointed by the Government to inspect Mr. Heard's Boat, gave a favorable report of her, she would be taken for the Mail service. Mr. Heard informed us on Saturday last, with much more warmth than politeness, that this statement "was false"—he positively denied that there was any stipulation of the kind—he said there was no talk or understanding about an investigation by Commissioners. We were taken with considerable surprise at this point blank denial of what we all along considered as an indisputable fact, and we freely admitted to Mr. Heard that if he were right, and our information wrong, he had not been well used, and that he had grounds of action against the Government. Mr. Heard asked us publicly to deny the statement we had made—we refused to do so until better informed.

Now, reader, mark the attempt made to blindfold us, and place us in a false position.

In the course of the afternoon we communicated with parties thoroughly conversant with the whole facts of the case, stating Mr. Heard's modest request, and we learned that our published statement was strictly correct. When the Government signified their willingness to accept Mr. Heard's last tender, he was told, by a letter from the Attorney General, that so soon as the Commissioners would inspect and report upon his vessel, the contract would be prepared for signature. Could he have supposed that the contract would be concluded if the report was an unfavorable one, as it was? Did he not agree to this condition, by allowing the Commissioners to go on board his vessel, for the purpose of executing their commission, and in order more fully to test the capacity of his boat, took one of them to Pictou? But what said the advertisement, issued from the Secretary's office in November last, and published in the Royal Gazette, inviting steamboat proprietors to furnish tenders for the carrying of the Mails? It clearly stated that any steamboat selected for the service must be of "competent power and capacity," and be "subject to the approval of Commissioners to be appointed by the Government." In accordance with this advertisement, Mr. Heard tendered the Rosebud—the Commissioners alluded to were appointed, and they reported that the Rosebud had not the power and capacity requisite for the service. Could any one be so mad as to suppose that the contract would be concluded in the face of such a report? And yet Mr. Heard thinks he is an injured man, and has no doubt tried to make others as well as us believe that there was no condition about an investigation—a condition likewise subsequently imposed upon the owner of the Lady le Marchant.

Mr. Heard's petulant advertisement in the Islander gave rise to the remarks in our last issue. The next time he rushes into print on this subject, and we believe he has promised to do so, we suggest to him the propriety of publishing the whole correspondence with the Government—not forgetting the Commissioners' report, a copy of which has, no doubt, been handed to him.

We have to thank the Hon. Mr. Howe—who has but recently returned from England after a successful negotiation on behalf of the Railway—for copies of the London editions of his recent pamphlets: the first being his masterly speech, delivered in the Nova Scotia Legislature, on the 11th March, 1854, on the Union of the North American Provinces; and the second, a "Letter to the Hon. Francis Hincks, being a review of his reply to Mr. Howe's speech." We expressed our opinion of Mr. Howe's magnificent speech, shortly after it appeared in print in the newspapers of the sister Province, and a second perusal of it now, with the author's corrections, has certainly not lessened our admiration. We observe that it has been reproduced from the Pictou press, in pamphlet form, and we have no doubt that it will, as it should, command an extensive circulation.—The letter to Mr. Hincks bears, upon every page, all the marks of Mr. Howe's vigorous and caustic pen, and shews at every turn with what facility he can tumble down the specious arguments of even a clever adversary like Mr. Hincks. Apart from the personal rencontre with the new Governor of Barbadoes, the Letter gives much new matter on Mr. Howe's favourite topic, namely, the right to participation by Colonists "in the public employments and distinctions of the Empire," and forms, on that account, an admirable supplement to the speech. We should like to have seen Mr. Hincks's pamphlet, and judge of its merits from an entire perusal. We can only form an opinion of it from Mr. Howe's Review; and by that we learn, that Mr. Hincks strove to maintain the position, that British American Colonists require nothing further to be done for them at the hands of the Imperial Cabinet. It is rather singular that just about the time the controversy was going on, Mr. Hincks—a British American Colonist—was in pursuit of the privileges and distinctions for himself, for which his adversary was contending on behalf of the whole Colonial world.

Nox of the public employments in this Colony have been so much the subject of observation and attack as the Exchequer. From the attention so unremittingly given to it by the Islander, one would suppose it was that particular office which the editor deems his lawful prize, in the event of a change of parties, and for the discharge of the duties of which he considers himself most competent. He has reminded us two or three times how admirably the office was filled by Mr. Stewart, and is almost every week hinting that Mr. Stewart's successor is not to be

found—that there is speculation somewhere, or is sure to be, all because the accounts are not kept by double entry; and that if Mr. Stewart were again in the office, or any body else but Mr. Clark, the revenue would be quite safe. Now, we wish to call the attention of the editor of the Islander to the following extract from the Minutes of the monthly meeting of the Committee of the Royal Agricultural Society, held on the 3d October, and published in Hazzard's Gazette of the 6th; and as Maclean pretends to know so much about Mr. Stewart's method of, and ability for, keeping accounts, he will please to inform us whether the "double entry" plan was adopted in the case of the Agricultural Society, since the result appears to have been so very satisfactory.—

"Mr. Pothick, from the Committee appointed to report upon the late Secretary's accounts, presented abstracts furnished by the Public Auditor, Mr. Curdall. One of these abstracts exhibited a deficiency in the implement account of seventy-four pounds four shillings and ten pence half-penny, (£74 4s 10½d). It was therefore ordered that the late Secretary, Mr. Stewart, be furnished with a copy of said abstract and of this minute, and be called upon to pay over to the Secretary and Treasurer of the Royal Agricultural Society the above amount.

"Ordered, That the consideration of the cash balance due to the Society by the late Secretary, and the deficiency on the "seed's account," be deferred until next Committee Meeting, then to be finally disposed of."

In bringing this unfortunate affair before the public we are actuated by no ill-feeling towards the ex-Secretary; but since he cannot resist the luxury of paying—whether directly or indirectly is a matter of no consequence—a blackguard hireling like Maclean to libel the Liberal party, he must be content to bear a little punishment for the sins of that old reprobate.

From Mr. Cooper's manifesto in the last Advertiser—facetiously styled "Information for the People"—we perceive that he still totters under the infatuation, that his inability to settle the Escheat question was the sole cause of Lord John Russell's resignation of office. It has been our misfortune to read much drivelling absurdity from Mr. Cooper's pen, in connection with this question, but he has now fairly capped the climax in assigning such a reason for the noble lord's retirement. Rival parties in England would give any price for such a man as Mr. Cooper, who could thus easily and cheaply expel an adverse Minister from place and power.

The fine new ship Majestic, owned by the Hon. W. W. Lord, arrived here on Friday night last from Liverpool, G. B., after a passage of twenty-six days, freighted with goods for our Charlottetown merchants. The enterprising owner himself came passenger, and will, we understand, shortly return to England in the same ship. The Majestic has excellent accommodations for passengers, and carried out a large number on this her first outward trip.

The last two Nos. of the Islander have been extremely complimentary to the Government and to ourselves. In the paper of Friday week we had the lion's share of the abuse, for which we are, of course, duly grateful. It is evidently necessary to McLean's existence to have some one on whom he can vent his disappointment and ill temper. We are perfectly satisfied to let him fire away at us; the public never condescends to notice his peevishness—neither shall we.

HORTICULTURAL EXHIBITION.

The annual show of vegetables, fruits and flowers, took place at the Temperance Hall on Wednesday. The spacious room was well filled, and included amongst the visitors His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.
