Maritime Board Backs Ferry Plan

ALBERTON — The proposed new ferry service from West Point to the New Brunswick mainland received a tremendous boost on Monday when the project was given the unanimous support and encouragement of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade.

Word of this interesting new development was learned yesterday from C. R. Leard who introduced a motion requesting support at the quarterly meeting of directors in Moncton. Mr. Leard is vice-president for P.E.I. on the Maritime Board and secretary-treasurer of Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade.

In addition to the influential support from the Maritime Board of Trade a number of prominent members from among the 50 in attendance, expressed keen interest in the proposal and offered their individual assistance in furthering the project.

It has also been learned that Halifax Dock Yards and Saint John Dry Dock officials have been approached for assistance.

Robbery With Violence Trial Begins In S'side

SUMMERSIDE — Evidence of a savage beating and robbery, followed by a 10-mile police chase after a stolen car near Day's Corner was unfolded yesterday as the trial of Alban Luce, 17, Summerside charged with robbery with violence, commenced in Prince County Court before Judge W. E. Darby.

The charge resulted from an incident on Second Street on the night of Dec. 30 when Joseph O. Martin of Summerside was alleged to have been badly beaten and robbed of \$5.

The case was adjourned late yesterday afternoon after seven Crown witnesses had been called by Crown Prosecutor George R. McMahon. His Honor stated the case would be continued this morning at 10:30 o'clock.

Following the Crown's evidence, defence attorney, G. Bruce MacDonald asked for dismissal on grounds that proper identification had not been made by the complainant, Mr. Martin and because no evidence had been presented that there had been "fear of violence" before the actual robbery, which he contended was necessary in a case laid under this section of the Criminal Code.

Witnesses called were Martin, who told of being attacked and robbed after getting in his car by a young man he identified as the accused, after the two left a house on Second Street, where Martin first met him a few minutes earlier. He related how he was knocked out twice and finally managed to get to the Linkletter Motel where the night watchman phoned the police.

Police Officers Stewart Berry and Neil Sharp related how they started out to take Martin to Prince County Hospital when they overtook Martin's stolen car going west on Notre Dame Street and gave chase. They were unable to catch it until a taxi passed them, then passed the other vehicle and slowed down in front of it forcing the man in the stolen car to come almost to a stop.

Neither Constable could identify the man who fled the vehicle and vanished in the woods nearby. The taxi was driven by Ronald Collicutt, they stated.

Evidence showed that after Const. Sharp had left for Summerside in the police car with Mr. Martin, Const. Berry got in the taxi with the driver, Mr. Collicutt, and started to drive

with him. Only a short distance down the road they met a hitchhiker who turned out to be the accused. The police officer took two wallets from him, during a search of his person and placed him under arrest.

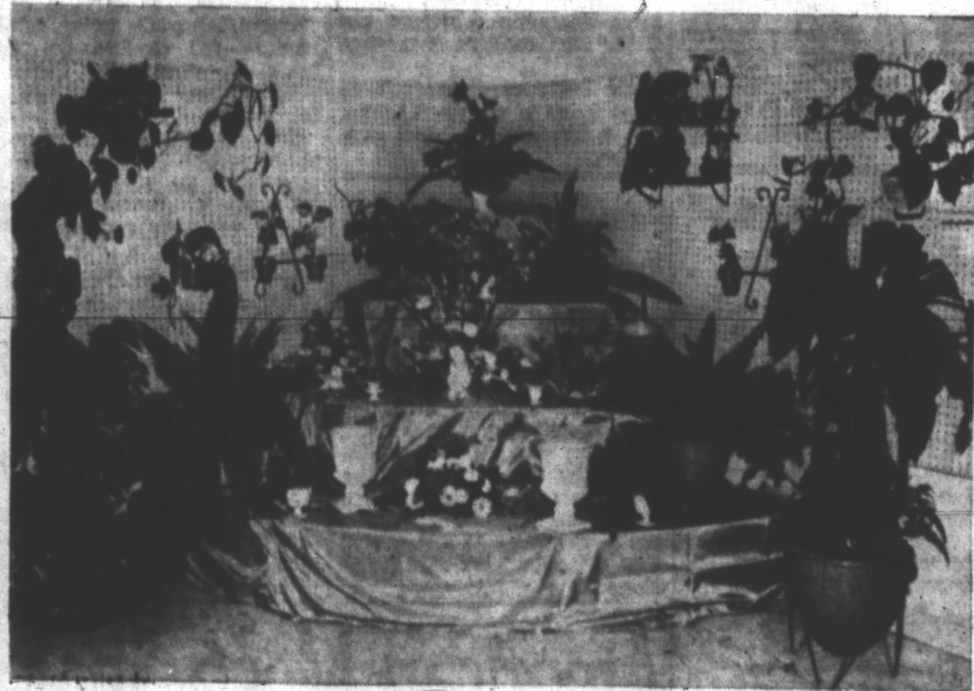
Dr. Sheldon Cameron told the court Martin sustained a broken bone in the left hand between the thumb and wrist and also injury to the right eye.

Emmanuel Gallant, told of the two men, the accused, and later on, Martin being at his home and leaving together.

Collicutt explained that he saw the police chasing the car and decided to follow and later helped to stop the stolen vehicle.
