OVER one hundred and fifty visitors to the Dominion Exhibition returned home last evening.

It is expected that the P. E. Island Railway will do a larger business this fall than ever before.

THE prison guards seem determined on killing Galtreau. Two premeditated attempts have now been made upon his life.

L. B. ARCHIBALD, Esq., left for Fredericton this morning, to take delivery of two locomotives for the P. E. Island Railway.

Two English missionaries were stoned by a mob at Foo Chow, China. The authorities express themselves as willing to make amends.

CHOLERA has broken out among the pilgrims in Mecca, and communication between the Egyptian and Arabian coasts has been stopped.

SHERIFF TEMPLE and Miss Temple and Mr. Robert Orr and Mrs. Baker, of Fredericton, are visiting the city. They are staying at the Rankin.

REV. HOWARD SPRAGUE, says the St. Croix "Concrist" has accepted a call to the Fredericton Methodist Church for one year, beginning next July.

THE withdrawal of the Chinese students from the United States is now attributed to the unpopularity of the new treaty between the two countries.

MR. SPARROW, one of the English agricultural delegates who visited Canada last year, has invested in farm property in the vicinity of Hamilton, Ont.

A COMPLICATED DISEASE.—Typho-malarial fever-billious-choleic pneumonia is playing sad havoc among persons rendered homeless by recent forest fires. In Michigan there are many deaths, and several are now dying.

JOHN McMASTERS informs us that unless the young man who stole the dog from the steamer "Heather Bells," on Wednesday evening, at Orwell, returns the same immediately he will be prosecuted.—In.

THE Stipendiary Magistrate, yesterday evening, gave evidence in the case of Henry Green, charged with breaking the Scott Act. Mr. G. was fined \$100 and costs or three months' imprisonment. He took the option of three months, and will pay the fine in jail.

THE crew of the ship Calista Haws, abandoned the vessel off Seal Island, set her on fire, and sailed for Shelbourne, where they arrived on Wednesday morning. The sailors were committed to jail to await trial for mutiny.

A MEETING of the Hillsborough Regatta Committee will be held on Monday evening, at eight o'clock, at the office of Armas Lord, Esq., to make final arrangements for the Regatta on the 12th inst. A full attendance is requested.

THE Commission appointed by the Government to report upon the management of the Charlottetown Hospital for the Insane, has adjourned until Tuesday, 4th October, at 10 a. m., when it will again open in the House of Assembly Room.

A POST OFFICE has been established at Hazel Green, Lot 52, and is to be opened today, 1st October. This office will supply a want long felt in that settlement, which is five miles from Peake's Station and six from the head of Cardigan. Mr. Joseph Haley has been appointed Postmaster.

THE Superintendent of the Railway has furnished Mr. Houls with a velocipede, so that he now propels himself over the line, and is able to inspect the sleepers as he goes along. Mr. McPherson will also be provided with a velocipede.

THE revenue of the Charlottetown Post Office for the year ended 30th June, 1875, was \$7,970.92, exclusive of money order business, and for the past year it was \$10,219.60, being an increase of 33.15 per cent., although the postage rates have been reduced in many instances within that time.

THE Rev. Charles A. Tanner of Montreal will preach to-morrow, D. V., in the Kirk, at 11 o'clock, a. m., also in Zion Church at half-past 6 p. m. Mr. Tanner will also lecture on French Evangelization in Prince Street Presbyterian Church at 3 o'clock.

NEWFOUNDLAND RAILWAY.—About eight miles of grading has been done on the Newfoundland Railway, and in a few days track-laying will be commenced. As the work progresses more hands are employed. During next summer the projectors of the new railroad propose extending the facilities for doing the work. They expect during the next year to have five or six construction trains on the road. The line is to extend some 300 miles. The superintendent of the Newfoundland road has recently purchased one locomotive—of the six driving wheel pattern, built by the Baldwin Locomotive Works—from the New Brunswick Railroad, besides six flat cars and one box car.—St. John Telegraph.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

New York, Sept. 29.

The Garfield fund to-day amounts to \$329,616.29.

CITY OF MEXICO, Sept. 29.

Gov. Fernandez, of the Federal District and Council, of this city, has decreed that there be funeral honors to the late President Garfield.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.

A message of condolence to Mrs. Garfield and the American people has been received from the Emperor of Japan and appropriately answered.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

MANCHESTER, Sept. 29.

The Chamber of Commerce yesterday, on the occasion of its first meeting since the death of President Garfield, passed a very sympathetic resolution. The Bishop of Manchester has written a sympathetic letter to Mr. Shaw, the American Consul here.

LONDON, Sept. 29.

The Earl of Derby, in an article in the Nineteenth Century, on the Land Act, contends that the land question as it regards Irish opinion is unsettled, nor is it likely to be settled. To speak of the Land League as the work of a few demagogues, anxious only to draw subscriptions from American sympathizers, is childish. We must not over rate the effect of what we have done. We must not indulge in the pleasant dream of a contented, loyal people. We are at the beginning of the struggle—not at the end.

The Dublin correspondent of the Standard writes that the Land League has decided to appoint two tenants in each neighborhood to assess "Fair Rent," having strict regard to the necessity of leaving tenants means for an improved mode of living. The amount thus fixed is to be registered by a local branch of the League, and no greater rent is to be paid. The correspondent says if this plan is universally adopted it must pave the way for general dissatisfaction with decisions of the Commission.

DUBLIN, Sept. 29.

Forty landed proprietors and land agents of County Carlow have passed resolutions declaring their intention to give effect to the Land Bill in a spirit friendly to the tenants and asking their co-operation in re-establishing confidence and good feeling.

Mr. Boycott, protected by police, was in Westport during Tuesday. He was followed by a mob during the whole time, and his effigy was afterwards burned.

LONDON, Sept. 29.

The Times' Dublin despatch says several ambulance wagons which left Athlone Barracks with police and soldiers for the Shannon Bridge, County Westmeath, to protect a process server, were obliged to return on account of the roads being broken up and obstructions placed upon them.

The Standard's Rome despatch says: "The Extraordinary Congregation which has been a long time making an examination, with the object of ascertaining what action the Vatican can take in regard to the disturbed state of Ireland, concluded its labors. The general result is that there are no means of accommodating the different views of the Irish bishops, because the Congregation sees no way of interfering in strictly political matters."

DUBLIN, Sept. 29.

The Bishops assembled at Maynooth claim State aid for training Catholic teachers and for convent schools.

LONDON, Sept. 29.

The Times publishes a draft of the Scottish Land Bill, prepared by the Scottish Chamber of Agriculture, which provides for the adjustment of rents by arbitration, a re-valuation of farms, and for power in the tenant to sell his holding. The Times says it is one of the most far reaching measures on the land question ever submitted to Parliament. It makes the strictest provision relative to compensation for improvement.

LONDON, Sept. 29.

In Burnley and Blackburn districts, further stoppage of spinners at present is unlikely. There is also a feeling against any further stoppage at Oldham. It is estimated that the direct loss of spinners and operatives in Lancashire, through the stoppage, has been £200,000.

LONDON, Sept. 29.

Alderman John Whittaker Ellis, of Broad street ward, who will be elected Lord Mayor of London to-day, is a Conservative and a prominent Freemason.

LIVERPOOL, Sept. 29.

The steamer Nestorian, which arrived today from Montreal, lost 76 cattle and 426 sheep on the passage.

EUROPEAN.

BERLIN, Sept. 20.

News from St. Petersburg states that an ukase is shortly expected codifying regulations for the protection of the Emperor, placing various bodies—the Imperial guard, the secret police at the palace and secret police department for the inspection of railways—under a single head, to whom all ministers and chief officials will be required to report immediately anything endangering the safety of the Emperor.

PARIS, Sept. 29.

At the sitting of the electric congress a question was raised in regard to the rights of property in submarine cables. At present no government has jurisdiction beyond three miles from the coast and the cutting of cables beyond that distance is not a criminal offence. Siemens, the well known cable manufacturer, strongly urged the importance of giving some protection to such valuable property as cables. A suggestion of Coehery, French minister of posts and telegraphs, that representations on the subject be made to the different governments, was agreed to.
