Superiors Win From Battery In Upset 12-9

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) WIMBLEDON, England, July 2—For the fifth time in her career, Helen Jacobs, the United States champion today fought her way to the finals of the all-England tennis championship with a 6-3, 6-2 victory over Jadwiga Jedrejowska of Poland.

On Saturday Miss Jacobs will play Frau Hilda Krahwinkel Sperling of Germany and Denmark for the title that escaped her by a single point last year when she muffed the simplest kind of a smash against Mrs. Helen Willis Moody.

Frau Sperling reached the championship round by defeating Mme. Simone Mathieu, France, 6-3, 6-2. Miss Jacobs seldom has looked better in her life than she did in spiking the heavy artillery of the hard-driving Miss Jedrejowska. For a while in the first set, when her opponent led 3-2 and then 4-3, the American's supporters were a bit worried.

Then Helen set down and fed her rival, who thrives on speed, nothing but soft shots. Before the match ended Jadwiga bore slight resemblance to the girl who had blasted Kay Stammers off the court in the quarter finals.

Miss Jedrejowska might just as well have let her strong forehead in the dressing room for all the chance she had to use it in the closing stages. Frau Sperling's retrieving ability finally broke her French opponent's heart. Mme. Mathieu rushed from the court, almost in tears without waiting for her conqueror. The German's long legs carried her over the court with remarkable speed and ease and she turned apparently unreachably shots into winning points.

Dean Hurls Cardinals To 4-2 Victory Over Pirates; Yankees Nose Out Red Sox

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 2—Jerome "Dizzy" Dean, and the Gas House Gang from St. Louis, defeated the third place Pittsburgh Pirates today 4-2. L. Zay held the bases to seven hits in winning his 14th victory of the season.

Big Jim Weaver, Pirate hurler, worked eight innings against the Cards and was charged with the loss of the game.

Bucky Walters pitched the Phillies out of the shadow of the National League cellar at Brooklyn by shutting out Dodgers with four hits for a 5-0 win.

The win secured for the Phils out of three starts in the current series, put the Quaker City outfit a game and a half away from the cellar-holding Dodgers.

New York Giants scored only in the first and last innings in Boston but piled up enough runs in those frames to nose out Boston Bees 7-6 and snap their four-game losing streak.

They belted Danny MacFayden out of the box with a six-run spree in the opening inning, counted on half a dozen hits and three Boston errors. In the ninth, with the score deadlocked, Burgess Whitehead singled and came home with the winning run on Mel Ott's double.

Chicago Cubs stopped Cincinnati's winning streak at seven straight today by taking an 8-6 13-inning victory.

The defeat dropped the Reds to fifth place as New York won over Boston Bees and enabled Chicago to stay at the heels of the league-leading Cardinals.

Washington Senators kept in the thick of the fight for second place in the League, defeating Athletics 4-3 at Philadelphia behind Earl Whitehill's strong pitching in the pitcher's box.

The A's filled the bases in the eighth with none out, but scored only one run as Niemiec forced Higgins at third and Hayes lined to stone, who doubled Johnson off second.

Detroit Tigers, behind the seven-hit pitching of Schoolboy Rowe, beat the faltering White Sox 7-1 in Chicago to sweep the abbreviated two-game series. It was Rowe's seventh victory of the season.

The Bengals, in winning their sixth straight tilt and their ninth in 10 starts, collected 10 hits off Johnny Whitehead and Clint Brown, mixing them with two Sox errors and Whitehead's wildness. Al Simmons led the Tiger attack with two doubles and a single in three trips.

Cleveland swept a doubleheader with Browns at St. Louis today, 14-6 and 4-2, to win two of the four games in the series. The Browns took one, the fourth was a tie.

Temperamental Johnny Allen held the Browns to five hits and Hal Trosky clouted his 20th home run of the season with one on as Cleveland won the second game. The Browns threatened in the ninth and had the bases full with two out when Julius Solters, one of the Browns' heavy sluggers, popped to the infield.

Bruce Campbell, Indian outfielder who made seven consecutive hits in the two games, was removed for a rest after an innings play in the second game.

"Babe" Ruth Leaves For Nova Scotia

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 2—George Herman "Babe" Ruth, the retired bantam of baseball, left New York today with his family and a party of friends for a vacation in Nova Scotia.

The Ruthian party sailed aboard the steamship Acadia. They will be the guests at Westville, N. S. of Dr. G. A. L. Irwin, a native of that town who now resides at Hollis, Long Island.

During his stay at Westville, the Babe will don cleats to show the natives how he used to sock the "apple" in his hey-day in the American League. The date of the game, probably between picked sides of local players, was not known to Ruth.

"I'll line up with the weaker side," he said.

Jacobs Makes Final Offer To Garden

NEW YORK, July 2—Mike Jacobs, promoter for the Twentieth Century Sporting Club today made what he declared was his last offer to Madison Square Garden in an effort to match James J. Braddock and Max Schmeling for the heavy weight boxing championship of the world.

Jacobs, who holds Schmeling's contract, offered to buy the Garden outright or to declare them in 50 percent of the profits, in either case the fight would be held in the Yankee Stadium with Jacobs promoting. The Garden, which holds Braddock's contract, has until July 29 to name an opponent for the champion.

Although Jacobs did not reveal what he had offered to pay the Garden, the latter previously had turned down two offers.

Jacobs declared that if the Garden turned down today's proposition, he would wait until July 29 and then attempt to deal directly with Braddock.
