WALTER D. CROKEN
Inserted by the family.
Funeral services were held
Saturday, Nov. 13, 1965 at St.
James Church, Summerfield for
Walter D. Croken who passed
away in Toronto on Tuesday,
November 9th. Born in Summer-
field in 1912 he was the son of
the late James E. and Mrs. Cro-
ken. His first wife the former
Eleanor Trainor of South Mel-
ville predeceased him in 1940
and they are survived by one
son, Francis of Emerald.
He is survived by his widow,
the former Margaret MacDon-
ald of Traverses Rest, three
sons, James, Alan and Eugene
and three daughters, Maureen,
Janet and Bernadine. He is also
survived by his mother, one brother,
Wilbert of Charlottetown and
one sister, Dorothy, Mrs. H.
M. Corbin of Halifax, and five
grandchildren.
Requiem High Mass was sung
by Rev. Basil Croken who also
conducted the services at the
grave. Also present in the sanc-
tuary was Rev. Harold Croken.

THE SECRET IS OUT

Five men are honored;
Join Grid Hall of Fame
TORONTO (CP) - Five men
were honored at the Grey Cup
dinner Friday night for their
contributions to Canadian foot-
ball.
They are Don McPherson of
Regina, Bob Reid of Toronto,
Barry O'Brien of Ottawa,
George McMahon of Calgary
and the late Jesse Fitton of
Toronto.
Guest speaker at the \$10-a-
plate dinner was Indian Jack
Jacobs, one-time quarterback
with Winnipeg Blue Bombers.
He played in two losing Grey
Cup games, the first in 1950
when the Bombers lost 13-0 to
Toronto-Argonauts and the second
in 1953 when Winnipeg
bowed 12-6 to Hamilton Tiger-
Cats.
O'Brien, 51, is a past presi-
dent and director of Ottawa
Rough Riders and a past presi-
dent of the Eastern Football
Conference. He's the son of J.
Ambrose O'Brien of Ottawa, a
founder of the National Hockey
League and a former owner of
Montreal Canadiens.
Born in Montreal, O'Brien
captained Newman High
School's football team and was
an all-state player in Lake-
wood, N.J., played intermediate
football for University of Toron-
to in 1936-37, joined the Royal
Canadian Navy in 1939 and left
in 1945 as lieutenant commander.
He was recently appointed a
governor of the University of
Ottawa.
McMahon, 46, is president
of the Western Football Confer-
ence and a member of the
management committee of Sas-
katchewan Roughriders. Born
in Regina, he attended Universi-
ty of Manitoba where he
played centre for the Bison
football team.
He served overseas with the
Fort Garry Horse tank corps
during the Second World War,
attaining the rank of major,
and returned to Regina to take
over the family farm supply
and machinery business.
He was president of the
Roughriders in 1955 and 1956,
president of the Canadian Foot-
ball League in 1959 and presi-
dent of the Canadian Rugby
Union in 1962. He was an alder-
man in Regina from 1953 to
1959 and is active in civic af-
fairs.
McMahon, 61, is president of
Calgary Stampede of the
WFC, a post he assumed in 1960
after joining the team as a di-
rector in 1956. He and his
brother, Frank, were responsi-
ble for the construction of the
20,000-seat McMahon Stadium,
built in 103 days in 1960 to re-
place Mewata Stadium. The
McMahons put up \$300,000.
Born in Moyie, B.C., Mc-
Mahon served with the Cana-
dian Scottish Regiment in 1928-
29 and was with the British
Columbia Regiment in 1942-43.
He was educated at public
schools in British Columbia, at-
tended high school, Gonzaga
University and Whitworth Col-
lege in Spokane, Wash. He was
active in the smelting and in-
vestment business before enter-
ing the oil business.
PLAYED FOR QUEEN'S
Fitton was born in Lancas-
hire, England, in 1810 and was
raised in Hamilton where he
played for Delta Collegiate,
1927 Canadian high school foot-
ball champions. He also played
football for Queen's and Mc-
Master universities in the 1930s.
He reorganized the CRU ju-
nior committee and served as
its secretary - registrar from
1945 until his death in 1952. He
introduced six-man football to
Canada in 1936.
-He was a flying officer and
physical education instructor in
the Royal Canadian Air Force
during the Second World War
and afterwards taught math-
ematics and physical education.
He was appointed vice - princi-
pal at Forest Hill Junior High
School in Toronto just before he
died.

Battle Of Bankers Sees Boston In Lead

NEW YORK AP - Boston's
last - place American Football
League Patriots forged into a
prominent spot in the race for
new professional football talent
Monday by signing four draft
choices, including their top two
picks - tackles Karl Singer of
Purdue and Jim Boudreaux of
Louisiana Tech.
At the same time, one of pre-
mier selections - fullback Jim
Grabowski of Illinois - ridiculed
the idea he had placed a \$500,
000 price tag on his services.
He is negotiating with teams
from both the AFL and National
Football League.
Tommy Nobis, all - America
linebacker from Texas, was be-
ing given the VIP treatment in
Atlanta by the NFL alcons,
who are trying for his signature
with Houston Oilers of the AFL.
The Patriots, whose 2-8 rec-
ord is the worst in the AFL,
landed their first and second
round choices in Singer and
Boudreaux. Both also were
picked by Cleveland Browns in
the NFL draft, Boudreaux on

Dickie Moore Does Well On Job

MONTREAL (CP) - It takes
more than a name to turn a
successful athlete into a suc-
cessful businessman.
Competitive spirit, essential
during his playing career, must
be converted into energy and
drive when he goes into busi-
ness. And he has to be ready to
devote plenty of time to his in-
terests.
Dickie Moore seems to re-
alize this.
One of the National Hockey
League's fiercest competitors
during his 13 seasons, Moore
turned down an opportunity to
return to Toronto Maple Leafs
this fall in favor of his busi-
nesses in Montreal.
He operates an expanding
construction equipment rental
firm, two summertime soft ice
cream outlets and is part-owner
of Arundel Golf Club 70 miles
north of Montreal.
Moore, who played with Mont-
real Canadiens for the better
part of 12 seasons, retired be-
cause of knee troubles at the
end of the 1962-63 hockey year.
After an operation and a one-
year layoff he returned to
hockey in a Maple Leaf uniform
for the 1964-65 season but had
difficulty getting untracked.
This fall, at 34, he decided
against returning to Toronto for
another try.
"NO COMPLAINTS"
"When I got a letter to re-
port this year from the Leafs,
I had to weigh the advantages
of playing another season or
staying in Montreal and operat-
ing my business," Moore said
the other day.
"Coach (Punch) Imlach and
the Toronto management
treated me fine and I had no
complaints - but I didn't
know how long my knees would
last."
Moore - said his original re-
tirement in 1963 was prompted
not only by his dinky knees but
by the knowledge that he had
been designated as "trade bait"
by Canadiens.
- I would have returned to
Canadiens then, because all my
career had been spent with
their organization since I was
