 MONTREAL, May 27—Despite a good demand for cattle on Montreal livestock markets today prices were unchanged while light offerings on other sections held prices even.  
 Receipts: Cattle 22; calves 137; hogs, 315; sheep and lambs 14.  
 1145 cattle were handled for export to Great Britain. 489 left here May 28 for Cardiff, and 656 were to leave May 28 for Birkenhead.

Cattle sold in small lots. Prices were from \$4.50 for common veals to \$6 for mediums.  
 A few lambs were sold at \$6 each for medium lambs to \$9 each for good lambs. Common light lambs sold as low as \$4.50 each. Sheep were from \$4 to \$5.  
 Hogs sold at \$8.40 weighed off trucks and at \$8.75 off cars. Sows were down to \$5.65.  
 Cattle offerings were light. A few good steers sold at \$3. Cows were steady at \$3.75 for good kinds.anners were \$1 to \$1.75. Bologna bulls were \$1.50 and butchers bulls of medium weights up to \$3.

## Steady Trend On Montreal Stock Market

 MONTREAL, May 27—Steady demand on Montreal Stock Exchange today brought generally firmer prices.  
 Papers and metals led listing into higher levels with advances from fractions to 2 5-8 points. Minor losses were exhibited by utilities while liquors were weaker and textiles steady.  
 St. Lawrence Paper preferred advanced 2 5-8 points and Dryden and St. Lawrence Corporation preferred gained 1-8 and 1-2 respectively. The other papers held firm. Noranda gained fractionally throughout the session and closed a point higher at 56 white Consolidated Smelting was up 1-4 and Hollinger and Nickel unchanged.  
 Distillers Seagram dropped a point to 23 while Canadian Industrial Alcohol "B" shares lost 1-8 and the "A" stock held unchanged. Heavy buying brought a 3-8 gain in Canadian Pacific Railway which closed at 12 3-4 and Lake of the Woods, as high as 22, eased to 21 1-2.  
 Textiles were steady with Bruck Silk and Canadian Canasee up in fractions. Banks generally were unchanged with Commerce 1-2 lower. Sales 15,400 shares; bonds \$6,300.

## Currencies

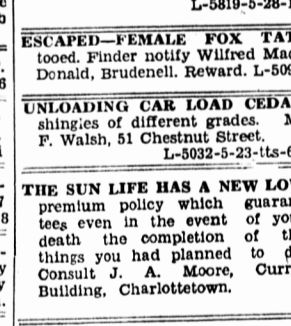

## Deaf Dogs

The very best retriever I ever saw was stone deaf. He had not always been so, but after a severe bout of distemper, the trouble came on and finally ended in deafness. The dog's master had regarded the young animal as promising before its illness, and as that ended in total deafness, was very sorry to have to destroy it.  
 An attempt was made to teach the dog to work entirely by signs, and the attempt succeeded perfectly. When the deaf dog's education was complete, he differed from all other retrievers in that he was always on the lookout for a sign. Did his master wish him to "come to heel," he swung his closed hand from front to rear, and the dog promptly obeyed. Was there a "runner" down an imperative forward sweep of the hand sent the dog for it, and the dog, knowing its infirmity, quickly learned to watch for his master's signs.  
 In point of fact his eye was seldom off his master, and even when retrieving from water. If the first "look direction" was from the hand of his master, and having swum out a little way turned again for his next sign. So it was that it beat all sound retrievers in water, for its habit of looking round made possible its guidance to a drifting duck however distant.  
 The dog was in fact a canine genius, and not a solitary one, for old collies which are stone deaf, and almost blind continue to do good work as long as they can distinguish a gesture. D M.

## Profit-taking Halts Climb On N.Y. Mart

 NEW YORK, May 27—Profit taking washed out some of the starch from today's stock market. While a few specialties managed to come out on top with sizable advances, the rest of the list dipped and rallied intermittently and the finish was moderately irregular.  
 The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was unchanged at 61.8, while transfers of 1,221,010 shares compared with 1,143,100 the day before.  
 Steel equities were given a run in the morning when "iron age" and discussing the boost in prices which takes place at the start of the third quarter, expressed the opinion that June should be the best month of the year for this industry because of the expected rush of consumers to fill requirements under present rates.  
 Motor stocks were a bit doubtful throughout the session as gossip was heard in automobile circles that manufacturers, owing to increased wages and other costs, might be forced to advance prices five to 10 per cent on next year's models.  
 Dome Mines gained a point to lead a generally firm Canadian list. Smaller advances were shown in Dominion Stores, Hiram Walker, Canadian Industrial Alcohol, Hollinger Mines, Lake Shore and Massey Harris. Shawinigan, Quebec Power, Ford of Canada, International Nickel and Distillers Seagram eased minor fractions.  
 Shares of Youngstown sheet and tube were lively performers with a gain of 3 3-8 at 60 1-8. U. S. Steel finished a net fraction higher at 60 7-8. Losers of as much as a point or so included American Telephone at 165, Santa Fe at 71 3-4, Consolidated Edison at 52 5-8, General Motors at 62 5-8 and Chrysler at 97.

## MINING

 TORONTO, May 27—Turnover on the Toronto mining share market today reached 3,242,000 shares, the heaviest since Jan. 24 last. Volume was concentrated in the cheaper golds and the gold group registered an advance of 1.60 to 1.82, a new high for 1936 and the miscellaneous mines index advanced a point to 129.89. The last half hour witnessed a sharp decline of prices for some of the early rise but most of them levelled off to close steady with part of their gains intact. Hard Rock failed to come back and it closed at 2.25 for a net loss of 26 cents.  
 Preston, O'Brien and Kirkland Lake held the interest of a large following. Preston, and Kirkland trading more than 300,000 shares each and O'Brien better than 100,000 shares. Preston pushed up to 2.05, broke back to 1.65 and rallied to 1.84 where it closed with a net gain of 29 cents. O'Brien touched a new high at 2.90 and closed at 2.76, up 26 cents net for the day and Kirkland Lake added 17 cents, closing at 83. Other substantial closings of the gold group were Anglo-Turonian, Gunnar, McWaters, Omega, Pamour, Pioneer, Pickle Crow, San Antonio and Wright Hargreaves. Pickle Crow stepped up 45 cents to 6.25. Dome added a point, Hollinger 1-8 and Pioneer 25 cents.
