

Jaycees Stage Dinner Meeting

The regular bi-monthly dinner meeting of the Charlottetown Junior Chamber of Commerce was held in Confederation Centre last evening at 6.30 p.m.

Guest speaker for the evening was George Hunt of Aeres Research and Planning, (H.C. Aeres and Company) the consultant firm who is doing the integrated survey of the province of Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Hunt stated the survey has been rolling for a year now and detailed recommendations would soon be in the hands of the Government on what they should do to get the economy of the Province rolling. He mentioned that this development is in the terms of \$100 to \$150 million over the next 10-year period. This project is one of action.

Since the field of agriculture is the prime one concerning Mr. Hunt, he felt that "an agriculture goes so goes the province." He said production could be easily tripled by Island farmers if proper techniques and management were used. With the great shortage in the world food supply and hunger and malnutrition prevalent in the world "we must develop our agricultural to the fullest extent."

Mr. Hunt was thanked on behalf of the unit by Jim Simmons. As part of the evening's program, Edgar Ellis and Bill Phillips were inducted as new members. Other guests included Lewis MacKay and Derek Mallett, a former member returning to the unit.

Each of the inductees and guests spoke during the business meeting.

Reports were heard from Elmer The Safety Elephant project and the unit was advised that they have won the Blood Donor Trophy Club from the Parkville Lions Club in last week's clinic; however attendance on behalf of the unit was very poor with only 61 per cent attending.

James Arnold MacLellan Gets Penitentiary Term

GEORGETOWN — James Arnold MacLellan of Souris was sentenced to serve a total of five years in Dorchester Penitentiary in Provincial Magistrate's Court in Georgetown yesterday by Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC. MacLellan was sentenced to

serve three years for breaking and entering the office of Melvin J. McQuaid, QC, in Souris and stealing \$5,985 and he was sentenced to serve two years in penitentiary, sentence to begin at the expiration of the three-year term, on a charge of escaping custody at the jail in Georgetown. A further two-year sentence for break, enter and theft at the store of R.J. MacDonald and Company in Cardigan will run concurrent with the two-year sentence for escaping custody.

MacLellan was represented by Lester P. O'Donnell, QC. Gordon Calum MacPherson of Flat River elected trail by a judge without a jury on a charge of escaping custody from Kings County Jail and also on a charge of break, enter and theft at the R.J. MacDonald and Company Store in Cardigan. Date for the preliminary hearing was set for October 20. MacPherson is also scheduled to have a preliminary hearing on October 20 on an earlier escaping custody charge.
