At the same time, in giving this co-operation, it must be the headmost determination of all of us that there be no profiteering of any kind—no unfair advantage taken by anyone—no enrichment for some while others are offering their lives.

NOT CONSULTED

The government during this crisis has not followed the course taken by Mr. Chamberlain by calling in consultation himself or the leaders of the other parties. Nevertheless, as in the other crises, as in this I informed Mr. King that I hold myself available for consultation and co-operation at any time, and any assistance I can give to Mr. King and his government will be freely given.

I learn by the press that a special session of Parliament is being called for next Thursday. In view of this, I am communicating to my followers the request that they be in Ottawa a day or two in advance of the session.

Britain Prepared Says Chamberlain In Stirring Speech

Prime Minister Cheered In Parliament As He Reads British Ultimatum

(By C. R. Blackburn, Canadian Press Staff Writer)

OTTAWA, Sept. 1.—Prime Minister Mackenzie King and his cabinet moved today swiftly and in complete unanimity to line up beside Great Britain in the threatened war against German aggression, summoned Parliament for next Thursday and proclaimed the War Measures Act of 1914.

At the same time the Government placed the militia, air and naval services on an active service footing and announced a pay and allowance schedule somewhat in excess of the old rate.

The Defence Department at once sent instructions to officers commanding the 10 military districts to call out additional units of the non-permanent militia.

The meeting started at 9:00 a. m. EDT (10:00 a. m. ADT) and a few minutes later Mr. King came out to announce Parliament had been called for Sept. 7. The announcements regarding defence measures came just after one p. m.

Pending the assembling of Parliament Mr. King said the Government was taking all necessary measures for the defence of Canada.

LONDON, Sept. 1.—(CP Cable)—The British Government today declared that it was prepared to go to war against Germany if the latter failed to accept the ultimatum which it had presented to the Reich.

While he did not actually use the word "ultimatum," the Prime Minister disclosed that the German Government had been warned that unless its troops were withdrawn from Poland "his Majesty's Government will without hesitation fulfil their obligations" to the invaded country.

The Prime Minister left no doubt that he believed Germany would not accept an ultimatum and this would leave Great Britain and France no alternative but to declare war.

BRITAIN PREPARED

The Prime Minister declared Great Britain was fully prepared in every respect and in a better position than in 1914. The fleet, the air force and the army are mobilized. While there was no need for a general appeal for recruits such as that issued in 1914, the Government introduced legislation to render all men between the ages of 18 and 41 liable to be conscripted.

The Prime Minister addressed the House in a solemn atmosphere, accentuated by the drawn blinds and shaded lights. He was cheered and a cheer was given before he left the House.

Mr. Chamberlain spoke with great feeling, but not with the usual calm. He pounded the big dispatch box in front of him. His voice, which seldom rises above the normal level, at times took on great volume.

He made one pointed reference to Premier Mussolini when he said that he had been trying his best during the past few days to prevent war.

Britain, he said, was prepared to see war through to the bitter end. She was offering the conflict with a clear conscience and with the support of the Dominions, and with the moral approval of most of the world.

Hitler has put himself grievously in the wrong, the Prime Minister declared.

Arch Enemy of Mankind

"He has become the arch enemy of mankind," he continued. "He has been guilty of the basest treachery to all the people of the world in the past he has given promises."

"We have no quarrel with the German people but while we have no reason against that people we shall enter the struggle with grim determination to overthrow that system of Government which has trampled on freedom, crucified men and women and brought the world back to the jackboots of old Prussianism."

"Out of the smoking ruins of the struggle will arise a new order of society. Dictatorship will be destroyed forever. I know in my heart that freedom and mankind's hope of the future cannot be quenched. I know liberty will prevail."

Chamberlain's Speech

LONDON, Sept. 1.—(By Radio)—(AP)—The text of Prime Minister Chamberlain's speech:—

I do not propose to say many words tonight. The time has come when we must speak in plain language. Eighteen months ago I prayed that the responsibility might not fall on me to ask this country to accept the awful arbitrament of war. I fear that I am not able to avoid that responsibility. The responsibility for this terrible catastrophe lies on the shoulders of one man. The German Chancellor has not hesitated to plunge the world into misery in order to serve his own senseless ambitions.

No man can say that the Government could have done more to try and keep open the way for honorable and equitable settlement of the dispute between Germany and Poland. The German Government has neglected any means of making it crystal clear to the German Government that if they insisted on using force again in the manner

Evacuation Of London And Paris Begins

LONDON, Sept. 1.—(CP Cable)—(Passed by British Censor)—While German bombers swooped over Polish cities, there began England today an exodus without parallel in human history.

The flight of the Israelis from Egypt was dwarfed as 3,000,000 children and mothers, the blind and the maimed, began to move from the big cities for unknown havens deep in the countryside.

Tired evacuation officials throughout the nation reported their organization checked like clockwork thousands upon thousands of tiny youngsters streamed from squalid back streets and suburban villages to railroad stations.

PARIS, Sept. 1.—(AP)—An ever-growing stream of perspiring humanity poured out of Paris this sweltering September night—the first time the public has taken seriously the government's repeated admonitions for all who could do so to flee before the threat of war.

Thousands of school children have been cleared out in the past couple of days, but their parents held back, wishing to abandon hope. But after reading afternoon papers they didn't need the extra brooding of the sixth evacuation request that was printed today.

Repercussions In Stock Market

MONTREAL, Sept. 1.—(CP)—The outbreak of hostilities in Europe depressed most prices on the stock market early today with losses ranging from fractions to eight points. Short selling was prohibited by governors of the exchange as a measure of protection to investors.

Bell Telephone topped the losers with a drop of eight points while declines of one to three appeared for Dominion Bridge, building products, Dosco, National Steel, Car. Smelters, Hollinger, Asbestos, Norma Hudson Bay Mining, Price Brothers and National Breweries. Other issues fell fractionally.
