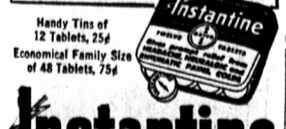

The new president, Mrs. Cecil McCarthy presided. The meeting opened with prayer.

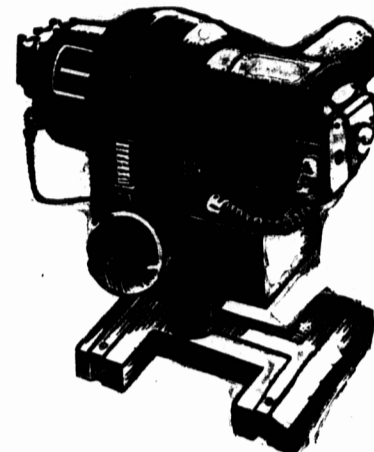
Correspondence was read from the Immigration clinic, President of Rustico sub-division, regarding

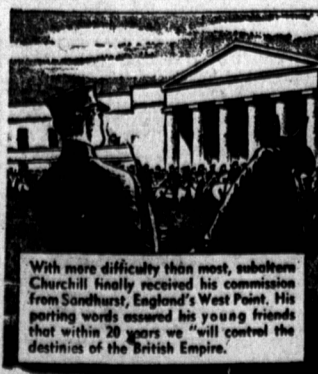
