Special Cars For Royal Tour Arrive Here

Six special automobiles will arrive this evening, and local representatives of the Chrysler, General Motors and Ford companies will provide an additional six cars to be used by the Royal Party on Friday. The motorcade escort for the parade is expected to arrive tomorrow evening. Military preparations for the day are now complete and include the firing of a Royal Salute by the 26th L.A.A. at the C. N. Equipment Now Being Installed In New Type Dragger For Island Firm



Tied up to the Buntain & Bell Wharf, the dragger "Paula Marie" arrived in Charlottetown on Oct. 31st for final installation of equipment before sailing for Souris, from where she will be operated by Harold and Francis Doucette of North Rustico. With a displacement of fifty-four tons and just under sixty feet in length, the vessel is equipped to drag a "Yankee 35" net from the starboard side and has space in the hold for upwards of 30 tons of iced fish. Modern radio and depth sounding aids are included in the equipment of the dragger, which is powered by a British Gardner diesel engine with a continuous rating of 114 horsepower at 900 r.p.m. Built under the supervision of the Fishermen's Loan Board by Wagstaff and Hatfield of Port Grenville, N.S., it was designed by Walter McInnis, an eminent authority on fishing boats, of the firm of Eldridge and McInnis, Boston, Mass. The propeller of forty eight inches diameter and forty four inches pitch, is the largest ever cast on the Island and was poured by Hall and Stavert, Ltd., of Charlottetown.

Educationists Holding Annual Meetings Here

The annual meetings of the Central Advisory Committee on Education for the Atlantic Provinces, and the Atlantic Provinces Common Examining Board to be held for the first time in Charlottetown this week at Prince of Wales College will commence this evening with a reception for the visiting delegates at the home of Dr. Frank MacKinnon, Principal of the Prince of Wales College. Approximately thirty five representatives from universities, colleges and Provincial departments of education will attend the sessions of the former organization, under the chairmanship of Dr. Watson Kirkconnell, President of Acadia University. Topics to be discussed will be curriculum, and requirements for entry and matriculation for entrance to universities. Meetings of the Advisory Committee will continue until noon tomorrow. The sitting of the Common Examining Board will commence at 2:30 tomorrow afternoon under the chairmanship of Dr. L. W. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Education for Prince Edward Island at which the business of the Board for the past year will be reviewed, and reports on the exams held last June, and on finances will be read. Plans will be also made for the setting and reading of examinations for Grades Eleven and Twelve for the school year '51-'52. It is hoped to conclude the sittings of the Board by Friday noon.

The Board is made up of representatives of the Provincial Departments of Education, the heads of universities, colleges, and secondary schools. The secretary is Mr. Ralph Kane of Halifax. Among those attending the meetings will be Dr. A. E. Kerr, President of Dalhousie University, Dr. P. J. Nicholson, President of St. Francis Xavier University, Dr. E. MacDiarmid of the Department of Education, Fredericton, N. B., Dr. H. P. Moffatt, Deputy Minister of Education for Nova Scotia, and Dr. A. G. Frecker, Deputy Minister of Education for Newfoundland.

Young Conservatives In Session Today

Mr. John Dietsenbaker, one of the most prominent members of the Progressive Conservative Party in Canada, will be the principal speaker at a public meeting to be held in the Empire Theatre here tonight. The meeting which follows the annual meeting of the Young Progressive Conservative Association, is sponsored by the latter group and is open to the public in general. The annual meeting of the Association will open at 10:00 A.M. with registration of delegates from all parts of the Province. The afternoon will be devoted to business sessions, but in its latter stages will be featured by a talk to the delegates by Mr. Leon Balcer, M.P., for Three Rivers, Que., and president of the National Young Progressive Conservative Association. A veteran of the past war during which he served as a naval lieutenant, Mr. Balcer is no stranger to Prince Edward Island, having made several previous visits.

Headlining the business sessions this afternoon will be the election of officers for the coming year, the passing of several resolutions and the discussions on formation of a new constitution. In the evening public meeting Mr. Gerald Foster, president of the Young Progressive Conservative Association, will preside and will introduce the guest speaker, Mr. Dietsenbaker. Also present and speaking briefly to the gathering will be Mr. R. R. Bell, Leader of the Opposition in the Provincial Legislature.

Heading the nominating committee which will submit a list of new officers will be Mr. Lloyd MacPhail, of New Haven, while bringing in the new constitution for study and consideration will be Mr. Leo Rossier, Morell, Chairman of the resolutions committee is Mr. W. Chester Macdonald, Summerside.

Needler, Director of the Biological Station, St. E. M. Gorman, secretary of the Committee. Announcement of the meeting was made by the Committee last month and at that time it was stated the purpose was to permit submissions and comments by representatives of the industry. Although the brief of the Fisheries Federation is the only prepared one known by the Committee it is believed that other oral ones will be presented. A large attendance is expected especially from the more important fishing centres as any submissions made may deal with any point of interest to the fisheries.
