

Ted Williams And Mantle Battle For Batting Title

NEW YORK (AP)—Ted Williams has a .352 batting average with 364 times at bat. Mickey Mantle is at .350. Each has 10 games left to play.

That's the picture of the competition for the American League batting title. But on closer examination, Mantle appears to be in a better position to win his first championship.

Here's why:

1. Williams must bat higher than Mantle as well as finish the campaign with a minimum of 400 official at bats. Mantle has been to the plate 512 times.

2. Six of Williams' remaining games will be against New York.

And the Boston Red Sox' thumper is hitting only .222 against the Yankees with eight hits in 36 trips.

3. Mantle, on the other hand, shows a .373 against Red Sox pitching with 19 safeties in 51 trips.

Of Williams' and the Red Sox' four other games, two will be against Kansas City and two against Washington. Mantle and the Yanks also will take on Chicago in a single encounter and Baltimore in a three-game set before winding up the campaign Sept. 30.

In the National League Hank Aaron of Milwaukee led in bat-

ting by an eight-point margin going into Monday night's twilight doubleheader against the Giants.

Aaron dropped one point to .327 last week but Pittsburgh's Bill Virdon, in second place, also lost a single point to .319.

Wally Moon of St. Louis and Red Schoendienst of New York are deadlocked for third place at .315.

The senior circuit's home run and runs batted in races probably will go right down to the wire.

Frank Robinson of Cincinnati, who set a major league record for first year men by slugging his 38th four-bagger, is deadlocked for the lead with Brooklyn's Duke Snider. Joe Adcock of Milwaukee is a close third with .37.

Stan Musial of St. Louis, a 306-batter, has replaced Ted Kluszewski of the Redlegs as the RBI leader. Stan has 103, one more than big Kluz.

Youngest International Pitcher To Meet Oldest

TORONTO (CP)—One of the international league's oldest pitchers will be hurling against one of the youngest today when Rochester Red Wings meet Toronto Maple Leafs in the first game of the Governor's Cup final series.

Lynn Lovenguth, the pitcher with the most wins in the league and most valuable right-hander, will be seeing his first playoff victory of the season for Leafs.

Wing southpaw will be throwing against him.

Lovenguth, 34, won 24 games

and lost 12 this season and had the best earned run average in the league.

Russell had a 5-5 win-and-loss record for Wings during the regular season, beating Leafs twice and losing to them once.

Neither manager is predicting the outcome of the best-of-seven final. Bruno Betzel, who gave the Leafs the 1956 pennant in his first year as manager of the team, hopes his club can make amends for last year's showing in the finals when Rochester knocked Leafs out in four straight games.

The game was awarded to the Halifax team in the sixth inning following a dispute over a call by the plate umpire.

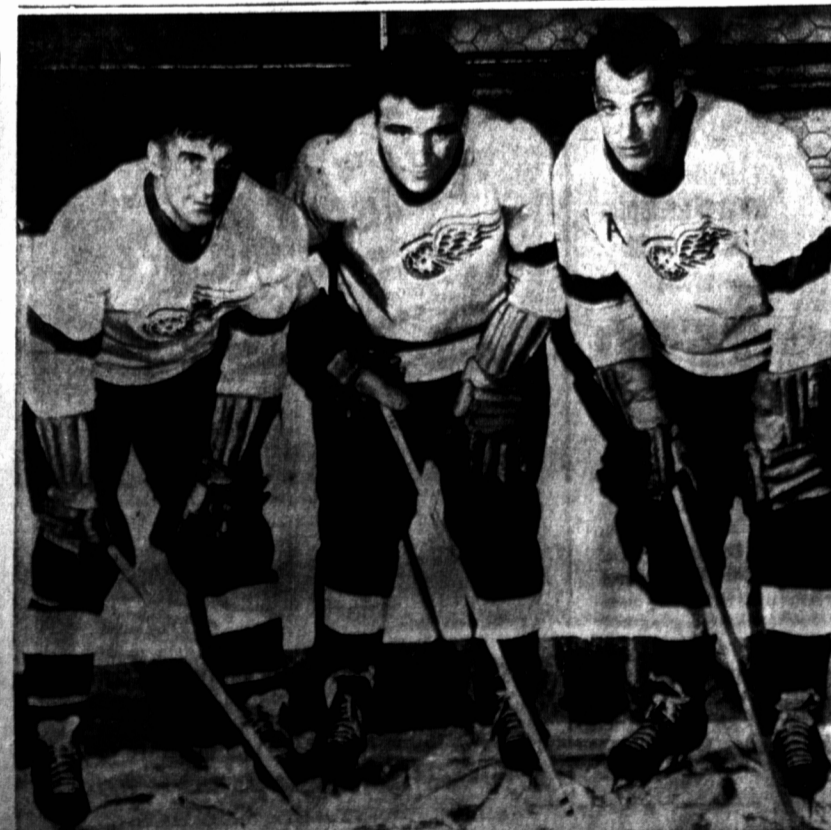

Dodgers Dump Cincinnati To Lengthen Lead In N. L. Race

BROOKLYN (AP)—Carl Furillo, Brooklyn's chips-down old pro, banged his 20th home run to lead off the 10th inning Monday night to give the National League leading Dodgers a 5-4 victory over third-place Cincinnati. The Redlegs had tied the score at 4-4 with back-to-back home runs by Ed Bailey and pinch-hitter Ray Jablonski with two out in the ninth.

Cincinnati's ninth-inning comeback ruined a dandy starting role by Clem Labine, Brooklyn's relief ace. He had checked the hard-swinging Redlegs on six hits until the ninth and retired 15 in a row.

NEW YORK (AP)—Home runs by Billy Bruton, Jack Dittmer

and Ed Mathews brought Milwaukee's second-place Braves a 4-1 nightcap victory Monday night against New York after southpaw Johnny Antonelli, hitting a two-run homer and giving up just six hits, had gained a 7-2 Giants' victory in the first game of a twinight doubleheader.

The split dropped the Braves a full game behind Brooklyn in the National League race, and two games short in the lost column.

The first-place Dodgers beat third-place Cincinnati in the 10th inning 5-4.

Southpaw Warren Spahn, gaining his 18th victory of the season and 201st in the majors, put down the Giants on nine hits in the second game, ending a three-game Milwaukee losing string.

Hindu Wand Wins Edinburg Gold Cup Leads Half Length

Wand, a British four-year-old just purchased by Max Bell of Calgary Monday scored a half length victory in the \$200 Edinburg Gold Cup over one mile and seven furlongs. Lord Rosebery's Cunningham was second and the Maze third in a field of five.

British Figure Skating Champ Retires At 16

LONDON (AP)—British figure skating champion Yvonne Sugden decided Monday to retire—at the tender age of 16.

"I have gained practically everything I can from ice skating," she said. "To continue would mean hard work that would hardly justify the sacrifice of two or three years to get only a place or two higher."

She has won the British women's figure skating title three straight years and missed a third place medal in the winter Olympics by only 2.32 points.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Al Rosen probably won't be with Cleveland Indians next year, general manager Hank Greenberg said Monday.

He also said in a speech sponsored by Sigma Delta Chi, journalistic fraternity, that Bob Feller could have a job with the Indians' organization if he decides to retire at the end of this season.

Greenberg said Rosen has "reached the mental state where he can't play in Cleveland any more."

Asked if that statement meant that the one-time slugging third baseman whose batting average has slumped this year was going on the auction block, the general manager replied:

"I think he would be better off playing with another team."

Internat'l League Attendance Up For Past Season

MONTREAL (CP)—President Frank Shaughnessy of the International Baseball League said Monday that the 1956 attendance was 10 per cent higher than that last season and reached a seven-year high.

Shaughnessy said the league drew 1,720,397 paying fans, against 1,553,205 in 1955, to record its best season since 1949.

It was the 24-year-old Briton's American debut and he made it an impressive and popular one with his game, strong comeback over his six-foot rival.

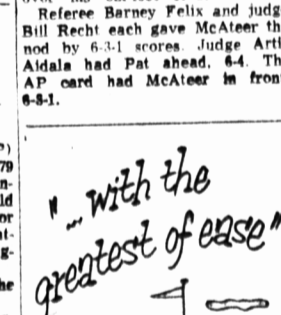

WINDERMERE, England (AP) A 48-year-old Briton covered 79 miles in one hour on Lake Windermere Monday to set a world record for unlimited class motor boats—a record-breaking attempt that nearly ended in tragedy.

Norman Buckley said after the hour's run:
