Important new appointments in Vancouver and Montreal are announced by The Royal Bank of Canada. T. F. Whitley, formerly General Inspector at Toronto, has been named an Assistant General Manager, in charge of British Columbia branches, with headquarters in Vancouver. He will assume his new duties on June 1st. This is a new post representing an expansion in the top administration of the bank's British Columbia affairs, necessitated by the marked increase in their volume and importance in recent years. A. F. McAlpine, Supervisor for British Columbia and the bank's senior officer in the province since 1946, retires on pension. Also announced is the appointment of Dr. D. B. Marsh as Assistant General Manager (Economic Research), a newly created post, with headquarters in Montreal. Dr. Marsh was formerly Director of Economic Research at the Royal Bank's Head Office. In 1954 he was appointed Bronfman Professor of Economics and Chairman of the Social Studies and Commerce Group of the Faculty of Arts and Science at McGill University where, since 1956, he has been Chairman of the Department of Economics and Political Science.
