

Preakness Stakes May Be Richest Race in History

BALTIMORE (AP) — The 33rd Preakness Stakes at Pimlico Saturday probably will be the richest race for three-year-olds in history.

When entries closed Friday 11 owners put up \$500 each to enter the classic and if all start the gross purse will hit \$190,000. Each owner must get up an additional \$1,000 to start in the race scheduled for a 5:45 p.m. EDT post time.

Any winner, except Nanassa Mauler, will net a record \$136,200 purse. The Mauler has a supplementary nominee at \$10,000 and his net would be \$126,200.

On the eve of the race the feeling grew that the classic would be a duel between Willie Shoemaker on Sword Dancer and Eddie Arcaro piloting First Landing.

If The Shoe fits Sword Dancer, it would be the initial Preakness victory for the 27-year-old jockey. Shoemaker rode Tom Lee to a nose victory over Sword Dan-

cer with Bill Boland up in the May 2 Derby. Tom Lee is not entered in the Preakness.

Eight of the horses in the mile and three-sixteenths Preakness competed at Louisville. In addition to Sword Dancer and First Landing, they are: Mrs. Hallina Braunstein's Royal Orbit (Derby 4th), the Claiborne Farm's Dunc View (8th); Anthony Imbesi's Rico Tesio (10th), C. B. Fischbach's Festival King (11th), and Patrice Jacobs' Our Dad (15th). Emil Doce's Manassa Mauler, Robert Lytle's Sundown 2nd, and L. G. Robinson's Marauder missed the Derby.

Rangers Nip Bruins 8-7

ESSEN, Germany (CP) — New York Rangers shamed Boston Bruins 4-3 before 3,500 fans Friday to take an 8-7 lead in the European exhibition tour between the National Hockey League clubs.

The teams continue the 22-game series in Krefeld, Germany today.

Eddie Shack, Eddie Litzenberger, Jack Bonnass and George Sullivan scored for the Rangers while Don McKenney, Dunc Brodie and Leo Boivin were the Boston marksmen.

Roy Harris To Start Comeback

CONROE, Tex. (AP) — Texas heavyweight boxing champion Roy Harris of Cut and Shoot will start his comeback next month when he meets big Charley Powell here June 9.

Powell former 48er football player from San Diego, Calif., stopped Nino Valdes, then the No. 2 heavyweight, at Miami Beach in his last outing.

Harris, who fought Floyd Patterson for the heavyweight title has not met any name fighters since. Patterson stopped Harris in 11 rounds.

DOWN THE BACK STRETCH



Joe O'Brien has arrived at Yonker Raceway, and has made arrangements for several horses that he will race there. The remainder of the two dozen horses he shipped East from the S. A. Camp training grounds at Shafter, California, will be at Goshen track.

Joe, who had the honor of being the second highest money-winning driver in the harness racing world last year (second to Billy Haughton) was the leading driver on the Grand Circuit. The horse to which most attention will be directed at Yonkers is the pacing colt, Shadow Wave, that set a world's record of 1:56 3/5 as a three-year-old last fall at Hollywood Park, Inglewood, Cal.

Shadow Wave will be a participant in the rich Trans-America series, worth \$250,000. The spring series will conclude at Yonkers on July 9th with a \$50,000 event. One of Joe's best trotters is Brogue Hanover, that last year won \$39,340 as a two-year-old and look a record of 2:05. He is eligible to the Triple Crown—the Yonkers Futurity, the Hambletonian, and the Kentucky Futurity, as well as all the other three-year-old trotting stakes.

Another horse that is highly regarded is Meadow Al, that took a two-year-old record last year of 2:00 3/5 and won \$60,651. He is the winter-book favorite for the W.H. Cane Pace and the Little Brown Jug.

YOUNG HORSES

There are a lot of young horses in the Camp Stable, and Joe is reported to be pretty high on them. One is Meadow Linda, a two-year-old pacing filly and a full sister to Meadow Al. Another is Blaze Hanover, a two-year-old trotting colt that cost the Camp Stable \$25,000 at the Harristburg sale last fall. Blaze Hanover is a full brother to Beck Hanover, that raced at Yonkers with great success a few years ago.

Driver, Parker, who has been racing a few members of the Camp Stable at Yonkers without too much success, as we noticed, probably because of the change from warm California to the almost frigid Yonkers weather, caught the speculators with a surprise win a few nights ago when he drove Adios Express first to the wire, and he paid \$30.40 for a \$2 wager. The Express horse took a record as a two-year-old last year of 2:01 1/5 and won \$57,250 for the season.

Joe has brought with him five two-year-old trotters by that super-star trotter of a few years ago, Scott Frost. 1:56 2/5. None of them has raced yet, but we understand that they will be in action within a few weeks. If they turn out to be exceptional performers, the Scott Frost stock will take a tremendous increase in value.

BRITISH GOLFERS LOSE FOUR MATCHES

MURFIELD, Scotland (CP)—The United States swept the four team matches away from Britain in Walker Golf Competition Friday and took a stranglehold on the international trophy.

The unexpected and rare shut-out left Britain with the near-impossible job of winning seven of today's eight singles matches in order to take the cup away from the U.S. The Americans have won 16 of the 17 competitions since the international rivalry started in 1922.

Friday's team play was Scotch foursomes, in which two men on a team play the same ball, hitting alternate shots.

Britain held a lead in two of the four matches at the end of the morning's 18 holes, but the U.S. team fought back in the afternoon round to gain its sweep.

CHANGE IN U.K. TEAM

Gerald Micklem, non-playing captain of the British team, announced one change in his lineup for today's matches. He substituted Dick Smith for Arthur Perowne, a farmer who returned to competition Friday for the first time after a two-year layoff and found nothing but trouble.

Perowne teamed with Michael Bonallack against U.S. team captain Charlie Coe and Billy Joe Patton and lost 9 and 8. Perowne repeatedly hit into trouble, giving his partner several scrambling recovery shots.

Coe, U.S. amateur champion, and Patton won the first four holes of their match and Bonallack and Perowne never had a chance to recover.

The biggest upset came when Bill Hyndman and Tommy Aaron combined over the final holes of the afternoon round to defeat Britain's No. 1 team of Joe Carr and Guy Wolstenholme 1 up.

ONE UP WIN

Harvie Ward and Dr. Frank Taylor also triumphed 1 up, over Reid Jack of Scotland and Doug Sewell.

Hearing Set For Monday

NEW YORK (AP)—Sugar Ray Robinson still rumbles as world middleweight champion in New York pending a hearing before the state athletic commission set for Monday afternoon.

Robinson's lawyer, Marvin Machat, delivered a letter to the commission shortly before Friday's meeting, called to consider vacating Ray's title.

Machat claimed Robinson had signed to meet Carmen Basilio Sept. 21 in Philadelphia's Municipal Stadium. He insisted the 30-year-old boxer thus has complied with a state Supreme Court order of April 30 directing him to "enter into articles of agreement to defend against Basilio or risk the vacating of his title by the commission in 15 days."

The catch is however, that Basilio has not signed.

According to the letter, a substantial guarantee (reported to be \$200,000 to \$250,000) will be offered Basilio.

The National Boxing Association already has stripped Robinson of his title although it has indicated it will reconsider if he and Basilio sign for a championship match.

The big question for the commission to decide will be what constitutes "entering into articles of agreement."

Riflemen Prepare For June Match

At 1:00 o'clock this afternoon marksmen from various Prince Edward Island centres will get down on the 300 yard firing point at Squaw Point Rifle Range to open the qualifying shoots for the Inter-Maritime match.

The qualifying round will be conducted for the next four Saturdays and will fire from the 200, 300, and 500 yard ranges, seven shots to count at each.

From these four shoots the eight top riflemen will be selected by a committee, composed of Major A. F. (Brick) Gurney, Major G. A. MacDonald, and Lieutenant A. K. Mutch.

The match, claimed to be the only one of its kind still conducted in Canada, will take place this year on June 19th at the Bedford Rifle Range a short distance from Halifax.

The match which has been run continuously, except for the war years, since 1925 is an annual friendly battle between teams representing New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

Last year the match was held at Squaw Point with the Nova Scotia team taking top honors.

OIFC Champs May Battle Mar. Winners

WATERLOO, Ont. (CP) — The Ontario Intercollegiate Football Conference champion this year may play off with the Maritimes winner.

Ontario league officials said Thursday that Don Loney, former Ottawa Rough Rider player who now coaches football at St. Francis Xavier University, had approached them with the idea of playing the post-season game.

The contest would be played Saturday, Nov. 14 in the Maritimes.

There are four teams in the Maritime conference—St. Francis Xavier, Dalhousie University, HMCs Shearwater and HMCs Stadacona.

The Ontario league has six teams — University of Waterloo Mules; Ontario Agricultural College Redmen, defending group champions; Royal Military College Cadets; Ottawa University Geegees; Carlton University Ravens, and McMaster Marauders.

Soccer Team Changes Name

NEW WESTMINSTER, B.C. (CP) — The New Westminster entry in the Inter-City Lacrosse League has dropped one of the oldest team names in Canada in favor of the name of the team's sponsor, a brewery.

The Salmonbellies will henceforth be known as O'Keefes. The bright red shirts with blue and white trim will be replaced with white sweaters with black and yellow trim.

The team, last year's national champions, is the third to change its name this season—Vancouver Pileeners became the Carlings and Nanaimo Timbermen became the Labatts.
