

Local and Other Items.

NEW POSTMASTER—Mr. Neil M. Donald has been appointed post master at Murray Harbor North in place of Mr. John C. McLure, resigned.

MORE FEARS OF THE SEASON.—A full-blown diphtheria was picked on the Salmon River Road, Cape Breton, last week. There are lots of them in the vicinity of Sydney. So says the Sydney Reporter.

THE CARROLL.—The steamer Carroll will be due here on Monday next, the 24th inst., and will be despatched without waiting for regular sailing day, possibly sailing from here on Tuesday evening, the 25th inst., to enable her to make another trip, if possible, before the close of navigation.

BUTTER FOR GERMANY.—Mr. Wilson, of Pugwash, N. S., has forwarded a sound shipment of butter to Hamburg, Germany, by steamer Damara, which sailed recently. The butter is packed in oak casks, each holding from 300 to 350 lbs.

THE FULL FINE EXACTED.—The Minister of Customs has decided that the owners of the schr. Snow Drift, of Souris, lately caught smuggling liquors from St. Pierre, shall pay the full fine of four hundred dollars. Otherwise their vessel will be confiscated.

WORTH SEEING.—The show windows of Connolly & Co.'s new store, on Queen Street, are well filled with the latest styles of lamps and glassware, and are attracting much attention. On Saturday evening the store was brilliantly lighted by electricity, and the effect was grand.

STILL DETAINED.—We learn that the Gloucester schooner Eastern Queen, is still detained at Souris. She is loaded with potatoes and turnips belonging to Matthew, McLean & Co., who have telegraphed the Department of Customs, Ottawa, asking that the cargo be released. What the upshot of the seizure will be is not yet known.

FOOTBALL.—Quite a number of spectators witnessed the football match between St. Dunstan's College second team and the Park Football Club at Victoria Park on Saturday afternoon. In the first half, Cassant, one of the half-backs of the College team, secured a try, which they failed to convert into a goal. Neither side scored in the second half. The game thus resulted in a victory for the collegians by a touch-down to nothing.

POLICE COURT.—This morning, a charge of glass-breaking preferred against a young man was withdrawn by the prosecutor, on the defendant agreeing to pay for the glass broken and court expenses. Another young man, against whom a charge of assault and battery was preferred by a woman named Graham, was ordered to pay a fine of \$1 and costs for drunkenness, and to defray the expenses of repairing a door which he had damaged during the *melee*. A drunk was disposed of for \$3 or 14 days.

MORE ISLAND HORSES.—The Moncton Transcript says: Mr. John W. McManus, of Memramcook, returned from P. E. Island on Wednesday, bringing with him seven horses for T. McManus & Sons. Among the horses is a valuable gray stallion, weighing 1300 lbs, which they will keep for stud purposes; also a iron grey Kingbird, a fine driver, said to be fast. The balance of the horses are for draught purposes and will be used in the lumber woods by the firm this winter.

HOUSE BURNED.—Last Friday evening about nine o'clock, the dwelling house of Angus McDonald, of Souris East, caught fire, and was, with most of its contents, consumed to ashes. There was a stiff breeze blowing at the time, and if the wind had been from any other quarter, other buildings, in all probability, would have also been burned. The accidental breaking of a lighted kerosene lamp, in the hands of one of the family, who was at work mending, up stairs, was the cause of the fire. The house and furniture were insured in the Scottish Union and National Insurance Company for \$400.

ABOUT POTATOES.—The potato rot has caused serious loss to farmers in the Cocagne settlement, where it is said in some cases the yield has been no more than five to one. Owing to the comparative failure of the crop in the western portion of Nova Scotia the prices are high—from fifty to sixty cents.

The Canning, N. S., Gazette says: "We learn that the price now being paid for potatoes has again reached 50 cents per bushel. It is quite likely they will still run considerably higher. United States reports show a steady market, with a gradual increase in price. Speculators have probably reaped a rich harvest at prices lately prevailing."

Another Financial Scare.

Big Firm in Trouble.

Assistance Just in Time

To Prevent Disaster.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16, 10.50 a. m.

Private cables received before the opening of the Stock Exchange, announcing troubles of Baring Bros., and stating that the Bank of England, Rothschilds and other bankers had taken up the accounts of Baring Bros., amounting to fifteen million pounds, created a profound sensation.

LONDON, Nov. 15.

The acceptances of Baring Bros. & Co. due to-day and Monday are guaranteed by financiers and the Bank of England. The liabilities are estimated at £15,000,000. The firm have not failed, but protracted liquidation will follow. The original cause of the trouble was Russia's withdrawal of several millions deposits on learning of the firm's dealings in Argentine and Uruguay bonds. The guarantee fund to Baring Bros. & Co. is estimated to amount to £10,000,000 stg.

The various financial, banking and discount houses guaranteeing the accounts state that the crisis is over, and that the failure of the firm has been avoided.

LONDON, Nov. 16

The Bank of England has subscribed £1,000,000, three joint stock banks have given £750,000 each, and two others £500,000 each to assist Baring Bros. Several other houses subscribed smaller amounts, the subscriptions making a total of £10,000,000. This will constitute a guarantee fund for three years. It is roughly estimated that the total liabilities of the firm, including £16,000,000 acceptances, amount to £21,000,000, while their assets at present prices are valued at £24,000,000. The Government has authorized the Bank of England, if necessary, to issue an additional £3,000,000 in notes, and it will supply the Bank Act if requisite.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Nov. 16.

It appears from full returns that the catch of seals by British Columbia sealers this season exceeds last year's by six thousand skins. The total returns at Victoria from home and foreign sealers is forty-three thousand.

The Post Office Department is negotiating with Hong Kong, Jamaica, Barbadoes and the Leeward Islands for parcel post and money order exchange.

Reports from the Northwest ranches indicate that the season has been a most successful one.

The revenue for the first four months of the present fiscal year exceeds the expenditure by five million dollars.

The impression here is that the Baring failure will not affect Canadian securities or deposits.

The O'Shea Divorce Case.

LONDON, Nov. 16.

To-day Mrs. O'Shea's counsel in the divorce case said he did not intend to cross-examine any witness or call any witness on behalf of Mrs. O'Shea or take any part in the proceedings. The collapse of the defence caused an immense sensation, and involves the condemnation of Parnell to pay all the costs. The collapse of the defence is tantamount to an acknowledgment of guilt to the court, and Parnell must pay the cost of the divorce proceedings. The Dublin Express says Parnell has informed several of the most prominent men of the Irish parliamentary party that he will not lead the party in parliament during the coming session.

Forger in the Tolls.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.

Albert H. Smith, Jr., partner of the Brokerage Firm of Mills, Robinson & Smith's, 98 Broadway, is a prisoner at police headquarters, charged with over 70 forgeries, aggregating \$350,000. Smith acknowledges his guilt and turned over all his property to W. A. Watson for the benefit of his creditors. Smith is forty-five years old. The counsel to Mill's, Robinson & Smith say this evening that the firm has assigned to W. A. Watson.

Overdue Steamers.

QUEBEC, Nov. 16.

The overdue steamers Lake Huron, Sarmatian and Amaranthia passed Father Point this morning at 6 o'clock, all well. The Lake Huron passed through the same storm as the Vancouver, and sustained slight damages.

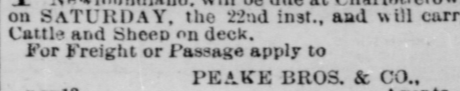

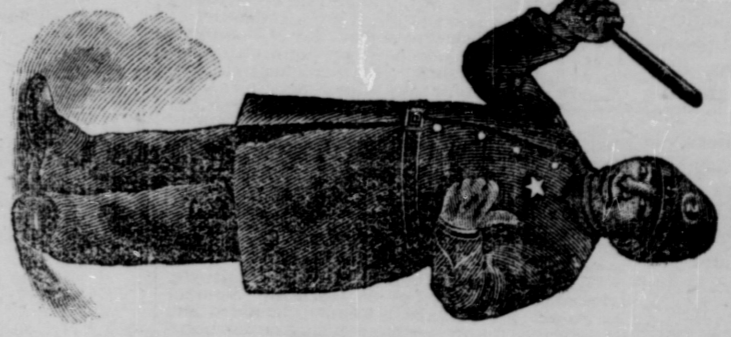
